State Uses But Fraction of Power

SALEM, Ore., May 28.—Of Oregon's total of 3,441,437 estimated horse-power in its numerous streams, the state engineering department, according to records on file, estimates that developed and partially developed projects represent only 487,187 horse-power, while there is actually developed and in use only 165,078 horse-power. The remaining 2,954,250 is going to waste entirely.

AERIAL MANEUVERS
SAN PEDRO, Cal., May 31.—An intensive program of summer and fall maneuvers for the air forces of the Pacific fleet is planned by Captain William A. Moffat, director of naval aviation, it was announced here recently.

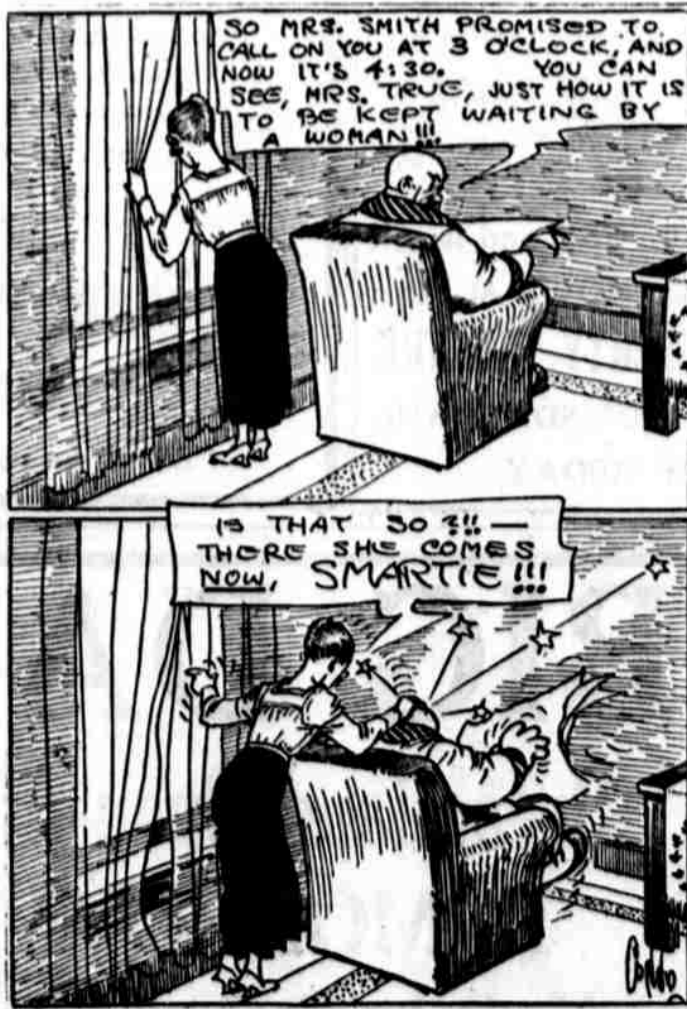
