THE SOLDIERS BONUS BILL

(That the readers of this paper may become thoroughly familiar with all the facts connected with the co-called Soldiers' bonus bill. The Herald will publish a series of articles by Don Belding, setting forth the various features of this measure that the people of the state will pass judgment on next month. It should be fully understood that under the loan feature of the measure, the money is simply loaned to the boys; that it is advanced only up to 75 per cent of the value of the property in which it is invested and that it will be paid back, with interest, under the amortization plan provided in the bill. A thorough understanding of the new line provisions of the bill means the removal of any serious opposition to it.)

It is estimated that the loan feature of the bonus bill will be taken advantage of by at least 200 ex-service men of Klamath county. About one hundred of these ex-service men intend to build homes in Klamath Falls alone. Consider that only fifty actually build the homes within the next year and that each man borrows \$2,000 from the state for the purpose. This would place \$150,000 into Klamath Falls homes within the next year. And we may consider this a minimum.

This money will benefit practically every person in Klamath Falls. The man that makes the abstract, the man that draws the deed, the man that digs the basement, the men who build the brick or rock walls, the plumbers, the retail lumber yards and the men employed there, the carpenters, the lathers, the plasterers, the concrete workers, the electricians, the painters, the paper hangers, the hardware stores, the furniture stores, the plumbing shops and the banks. All these people receive the money direct and in cash. They pay it out and patronize every other industry in Klamath Falls and Klamath county. The homebuilding program should in Klamath alone furnish immediate employment for 200 skilled workmen and 200 common laborers. Every man who depends upon his trade for his living should then be vitally interested in the Soldier Relief measure and should spend a great deal of time talking for the bill, clearing points for those who do not understand it.
