OREGON BREVITIES

SALEM, June 4.—A protest against the recent decrease in gas rates for Portland and environs, and a request for the consideration of the case, was filed with the public service commission by the Portland Gas & Coke company.

PORTLAND, June 4.—In all matters that relate to livestock and dairying Portland and Oregon can easily lead the rest of the United States, in the opinion of H. A. Van Norman, dean of the college of agriculture of the University of California, and president of the National Dairy Show association.

PORTLAND, June 4.—Reopening of logging and sawmill operations by the Booth-Kelly organization in Wendling and Springfield is reported to the local office of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen. The mills and camps have been closed for four months, but it is expected now

that they soon will be operating full force. More than 400 men are said to be employed when the organization is in full operation.

PORTLAND, June 4.—It has remained for two Portland inventors to spring a sensation in the automotive world. P. W. Waltz and Willard Jahn of the Waltz Steam Motor corporation, 910 Belmont street, have perfected a steam motor driven motor car that is attracting the attention of automotive engineers throughout the country.

SALEM, June 4.—Careful estimates made in this section cause orchardists to calculate that the prune crop will be 50 per cent of normal. The crop will be spotted. There are some orchards, especially in the hills, usually bountiful, that this year will have only a short crop. The advent of warm weather reveals the fact that the crop even in the hills will be better than predicted a week or two ago and that the quality of the fruit will be excellent.

PORTLAND, June 4.—The Denver & Rio Grande has placed an order with Oregon mills for 900,000 feet of structural timbers and cross-ties. The Southern Pacific company made a purchase of 1,000,000 feet of ties and large dimension stock and the Chicago & Northwestern road recently bought an equal amount from local mills. The Philadelphia & Reading placed a small order and other eastern roads are making inquiries which promise to bring a large volume of business later in the season.

PORTLAND, June 4.—Lakes and marshes of Oregon will be stocked before long with French bullfrogs, the legs of which are claimed by authorities to be the most luscious that ever graced a croaker. A. E. Burghdoff, state game warden, announced that he had received six dozen of the frogs from the Idaho state game commission. These six dozen will be protected by the game commission until they have multiplied sufficiently to begin stocking waters in the vicinity of Portland.
