## Preparations for Election Keep the Clerk's Force Busy

There has been little chance or no chance to have much of a visit with County Clerk De Lap or his assistants in the last two days, and from the looks of the office and the rapidity of movement of all the employees, the entire office from the clerk down are glad that election day is not an every day affair.

Elections supplies and the distribution of the ballots, which are delivered today by the printer, were given special attention and Sheriff Low has been rushed to complete the delivery for the special election Tuesday, June 7, when state measures and the city refunding bond issue comes up for a decision.

Sample ballots show that the state measure and the refunding bond measure are on the same slip, headed by the state measure "Legislative Regulation and Compensation Amendment"; followed by the "World War Veterans' State Aid Fund, Constitutional Amendment"; the "Emergency Clause Veto, Consti-

tutional Amendment"; "Hygienic Marriage Examination and License Bill"; "The Women Juror, and Revised Jury Law." All of those measures are on the top portion of the ballot while at the bottom and running across the page is the city measure, headed, "Proposed by the Common Council, City of Klamath Falls, Oregon" and the measure underneath.

## Klamaths to Hold Council Monday

A council of the Klamath Indians will be held at the Agency Thursday afternoon, June 9, at 1 o'clock when the tribe will be given a written and verbal report upon the work accomplished by Clayton Kirk, who was sent to Washington, D. C., to look after the interests of the tribe in regard to property rights last fall.
