

OFFERS SEED FOR ASKING

A chance to secure free seed potatoes, corn, or celery plants is offered by J. J. Furber, manager of Klamath Falls creamery, who has a limited supply to distribute to bona fide planters. Mr. Furber says:

"There was a time when it was thought impossible to grow potatoes in Klamath county. That time is past. The same idea prevails regarding corn, both here and in many other sections.

"We have some seed of the following varieties for distribution in small lots. Not enough to market, but enough to try out and find if it can be grown successfully here.

"We would like to see some of the boys' clubs try out this seed and if any one interested will see Mr. Sexton or Mr. Thomas or write or call at our office we will be glad to give them samples for trial. The seed is free and all we ask is that it be tried out. The silage corn may be of great value in this locality in the feeding of stock. No one has tried this out to our knowledge but we believe that early and quick growing varieties can be grown successfully.

"We also have some celery started and will before long have celery plants which we will be glad to give to those who wish to try out a little celery.

"We also have Assiniboine yellow sweet corn, Nuetta sweet corn, Willis early June sweet corn, Golden Thumb popcorn, Willis Gehu corn.

Willis Dakota white flint corn, Pioneer white dent corn, Acme fodder corn, and Sweet fodder corn.

As there is only a limited amount of each, those who wish some of this seed should not wait but call or write for it at once."

Senate Will Honor Chamberlain With Quick Confirmation

WASHINGTON, June 6.—When the nomination of former Senator George E. Chamberlain reaches the senate as a member of the new United States Shipping board, he will be accorded the unusual tribute by his former colleagues of immediate confirmation without reference to committee and will be perhaps the first member of the board ready to qualify. This attitude of the senators was conveyed to Senator McNary this morning. It is expected the nomination may be received during the day.

Most Interest In Bonus Bill

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—Registered voters of Oregon tomorrow

will have opportunity to express their opinion on six measures referred to them by the legislature.

Greatest interest throughout the state is being taken in the proposed constitutional amendment under which the state would be authorized to issue bonds not to exceed three per cent on the assessed valuation of all property in the state to be loaned in amounts of not more than \$4,000, or paid as a bonus to ex-service men of \$15 for each month of active service not exceeding \$500. Other measures provide:

Extending length of legislative session from 40 to 60 days and increasing pay from \$3 to \$5 a day.

Empowering the governor to veto provisions in bills which declare emergencies without affecting other provisions of the bills.

Permitting women to serve as jurors and enabling them to release themselves from such service.

To require both applicants for marriage license to submit to and pass an examination by a regularly licensed physician.

Providing for appointment of Port of Portland commissioners by the governor.

Crater Lake Park Roads Included, Improvement Plan

WASHINGTON, June 6.—More good roads and improvements to present ones in Crater Lake National park. Glacier, Yellowstone and the other national play grounds is assured if the promised support for the new legislation to be presented by Senator Shortridge of California, materializes.

He will present in a day or two a plan for turning into a special fund in the federal treasury all fees collected from motorists visiting the parks to be available immediately and continuously for road repairs, maintenance, improvement and extensions in the parks where collected so that the motorists will have a continually improving attraction in the parks. As it is now the fees from registration entry, fines for traffic violations and other receipts from motorists are turned into the treasury and cannot be withdrawn except by specific appropriation by congress.

Each year the parks have to fight for money for the necessary maintenance and operation and get little or none for road development.

POLISH OFFICER, ACCUSED TRAITOR, EXECUTED FRIDAY

WARSAW, June 6.—Lieutenant Henry Iwanek, of the Polish flying corps, convicted by courtmartial of high treason in disposing of military secrets to British agents, was executed Friday by a firing squad.

Mail-carrying airplanes will land on the roof of the new government post office to be erected in Chicago. Cargoes will then be conveyed to motor trucks or trains via belts or tunnel cars.

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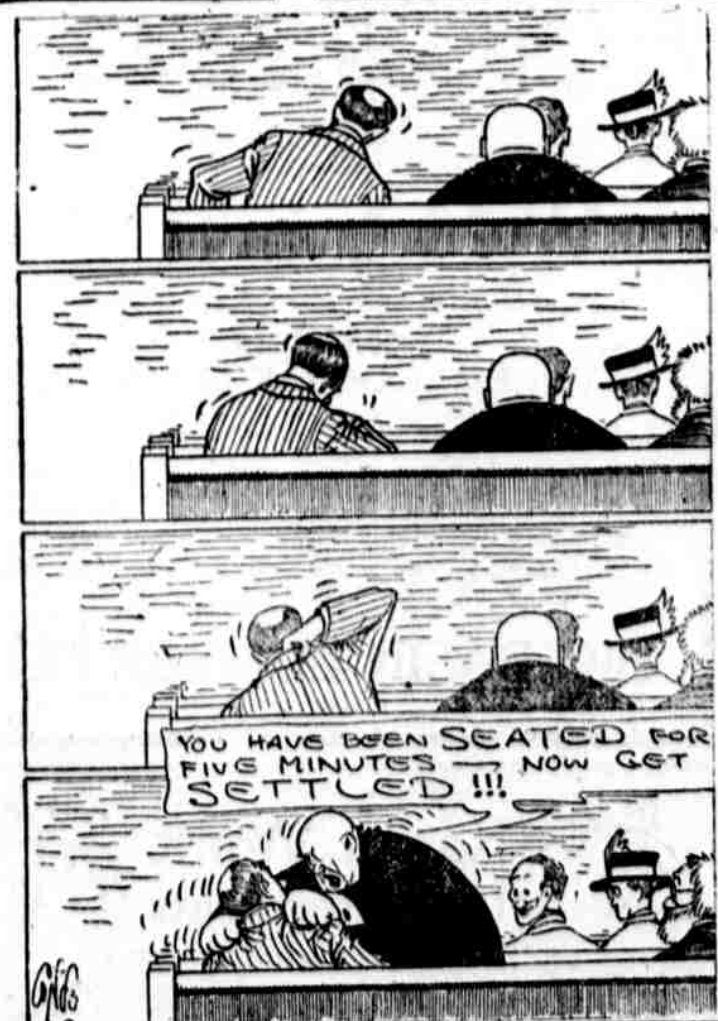
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
