OREGON BREVITIES

SALEM, June 7.—The machinery under which the new state budget law will be operative is being assembled and oiled up by Secretary of State Sam A. Koser. The law became effective May 25.

SALEM, June 7.—Articles of incorporation were filed by the Black Diamond Iron syndicate of Roseburg, capitalized at \$100,000.

PRAIRIE CITY, June 7.—The unusual late rains have made more grass in Grant county than has been seen here at one time in the last fifty years, so the oldest residents say. Stock conditions for beef cattle have never been better at this season of the year.

EUGENE, June 7.—The Oregon State Grange in session here adopted a resolution offered by George Harrow of Washington county, suggesting that the grange initiate a bill for the 1922 general election that would abolish the highway commission as it now stands and provide for the election by the people of one man to do the work of that body.

PORTLAND, June 7.—Thousands of giant rats, driven from the wharves and Front street basements by the high water, are swarming through the business section of Portland seeking new habitation. Complaints have begun pouring in to the authorities from store owners and shop keepers.

SALEM, June 7.—Marion county this year will produce more than 1,200 tons of strawberries, according to a report of growers who have made a survey of the district. The market is poor, however, and some of the

growers have offered to sell their berries to housewives as low as 3 cents a box. As a result of the low prices being paid for the berries, only a few pickers are in the fields.

SALEM, June 7.—Gasoline sales for April, 1921, showed an increase of 833,155 gallons over that distributed in Oregon during the preceding month, and an increase of 559,085 gallons in excess of the sales during April, 1920, according to a statement compiled by Sam A. Koser, secretary of state.

PORTLAND, June 7.—There is a stronger feeling in the wool market throughout the northwest and more activity than dealers had expected. All agree that the improvement can be credited directly to the enactment of the emergency tariff law. A month ago nothing but pessimistic talk could be heard in the trade, and it was freely predicted that unless the eastern mill situation showed a decided change for the better the new clip movement would drag for want of buyers.

CALIFORNIA NEWS

FRESNO, June 7.—Arrangements were completed by the California peach and fig growers for shipping late in June the first carload of fresh figs in the history of the fruit industry from California to Chicago and New York markets from Visalia.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—The last coal gas plant in California was allowed to suspend operations when this permission was given by the State Railroad Commission to the Jackson Gas Light company of Jackson Amador county.

REDDING, June 7.—The building of a permanent highway to Mount Lassen, the big safety valve in the Sierra Nevada range, appears to be a near-future reality, according to the Mount Lassen committee of the Redding Chamber of Commerce which is arousing interest in the project and soliciting funds for the construction of the road.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—Sufficient signatures have been secured for the filing of the referendum against the Wright dry bill, H. F. Stoll, secretary of the California Grape Growers' exchange, announced. The San Francisco petition will be filed Saturday bearing 31,000 names, and in other cities of the state they will be filed next week. In all 56,000 names have been secured or almost double the 34,434 requirement.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—The "American plan" of operation will be adopted by the San Francisco Builders' Exchange after June 13, according to official announcement. There will be no further negotiations with the building trades council, the announcement said.

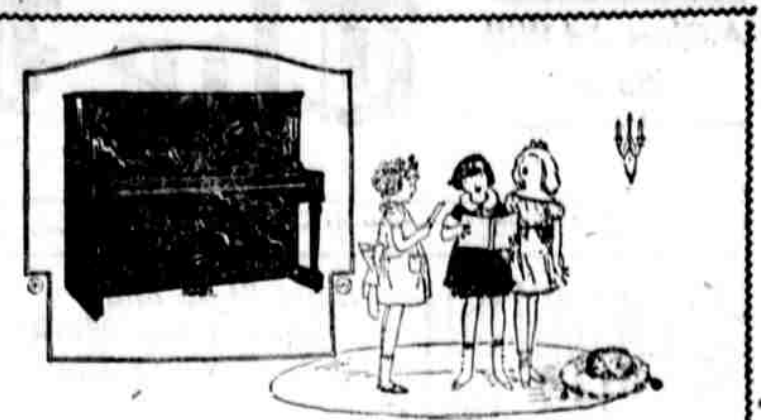
