CALIFORNIA NEWS

SACRAMENTO, June 10.—The outlook is now good for the California legislature appropriating \$200,000 for the construction of a bridge over the Klamath river at Requa and thereby removing the present ferry service, an obstacle to motor traffic.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 10.—Important work in connection with hard surface pavement has been begun in California and may have bearing on the type of road to be built in that state in the future. In connection with the work eight different sections of concrete highway are to be constructed at Pittsburg, Cal., all sections to be subject virtually to the same traffic.

SISSON, June 10.—The Rainbow Mill and Lumber company will start its sawmill this week for the first time this season. The company is undecided at this time just how much lumber will be cut this year.

YREKA, June 10.—Slakiyou county's biggest damage suit came to an end when a jury in the case of Proctor and Sarles versus The Mount Shasta Land and Irrigation company, A. L. Harlow, W. B. Wiggins and George Broughton arrived at a verdict, awarding the plaintiffs \$14,382.

SANTA ROSA, June 10.—A large number of local growers have been telegraphing Representative Clarence F. Lea of this district, asking him to protest against the proposed amendment to the Volstead Act which would put a ban on the making of beer for medicinal purposes.

SACRAMENTO, June 10.—Strawberry growers in California are facing the same troubles as the cherry growers of the Sebastopol district, with canneries refusing to take any interest in the crop or offering prices.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 10.—After arguments before the State Railroad Commission on the application of a group of California municipalities for adjustment downward of the gas rates charged by the Pacific Gas and Electric company, it was agreed these rates should be governed by the price of fuel oil.

REDDING, June 10.—H. Allen Rispin of San Francisco has purchased the Winona fruit orchard near Anderson at a price of \$125,000. The orchard embraces 210 acres and is best known as the Shade farm. This is the largest deal of its kind ever recorded in Shasta county.
