GREEKS READY TO LAUNCH OFFENSIVE AGAINST TURKS

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 15.—Opening of the Greek offensive against Turkish nationalists in Asia Minor is believed here to be imminent. British reserves are relieving the Greek eleventh division at Ismid, on the sea of Marmora, and it is proceeding to the Ushak front near the Bagdad railway north of Smyrna.
