**Cal. Man Predicts Great Development In Coast States**

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—Great events of the world during the next few generations are to take place in the nations and states bordering the Pacific, John S. Chambers, state comptroller, predicted in an address here yesterday at the twenty-sixth annual convention of the National Association of Credit Men.

"California and the western states must prepare to do their part in the great things that are to come," Mr. Chambers said. "It is necessary that

the state be placed upon a sound agricultural and industrial basis."

Mr. Chambers sketched briefly the history of California through the state's golden era to the present, when agriculture has become the preeminent natural industry. In 1920, he said, the total value of agricultural products, including livestock, amounted to \$680,000,000. The next production on the list was petroleum, valued at \$194,000,000. Gold, which once was first, was included among the minerals, which were valued at not quite \$49,000,000.

"The agricultural industry of California has by no means reached the full measure of development," Mr. Chambers declared. "As a matter of fact, the surface has just been scraped. Of the state's 100,000,000 acres, in large part mountainous and in some places desert, nearly 29,000,000 acres are in farms.
