FACTS ARE FACTS

The half-hearted apology attempted by another paper for the action of the three councilmen last Monday evening in rejecting the proposal of the Warren Construction company to pay par and accrued interest for the bonds advertised on the High-Sixth and Seventh streets unit falls flat in face of the facts, and can scarcely be harmonized with the action of the same councilmen in accepting the bid of the same company for the bonds on Washington street First to Ewauna boulevard on the same evening.

A visit to the office of the police judge and an examination of the record of both units discloses the following facts: Bids were received by the council on both units August 30, 1920, and contracts awarded on both subject to sale of the bonds for each unit. There the proceedings were apparently halted by the council; and for an obvious reason. After bids are received for the making of improvement of the nature under consideration approximately two months must be consumed in perfecting the basis upon which bonds, designed to cover the cost, are to rest for their validity and desirability as an investment.

Realizing that the proceedings could not be perfected before Nov. 1st, last season, too late to proceed with the work making the improvement, and with the desire of saving to the property owner the interest that would accrue if the bonds were sold last fall, the council deferred further action until the present season.

It was on February 7, 1921, that the assessment rolls were completed and filed on the two units in question. No objections having been filed the council adopted and the mayor approved the ordinance declaring the assessments, on March 1, 1921. The property owners were given notice that they had until April 4, 1921, in which to file their applications to pay in ten annual installments or in cash.

The property owners having all availed themselves of the ten year plan of payment and filed their applications, the "Bond Lien" docket was made up, and on May 2, 1921, the council adopted the ordinance authorizing the advertisement and the sale of the bonds in question.

The Warren Construction company was not in a position to insist that the bonds be advertised for sale last fall; in fact they do not occupy a position at any time in connection with the making of street improvements entitling them to insist upon or dictate the proceedings of the council. They simply occupy the position as contractors ready, in response to invitations of the councils to submit proposals for doing work or buying the bonds offered to cover the cost of the work.

It is difficult, under the facts, to see where any one can find justification for commending the three councilmen for placing this city in the position of repudiating a contract.

The condoning paper terms their action "fearless," but The Herald and most other people have another name for it.
