CHICAGO, June 18.—Rules and working conditions governing the Big Four brotherhoods of trainmen will continue in effect until changed by negotiations between the brotherhoods and railways, or railway labor board, under a ruling of the board announced today. The ruling interprets the board's decision of April 14, last, and abrogates the order of July, 1920.
