IRATE CROWD RUNS REFORMER OUT OF TOWN

McMINNVILLE, (Ore.), June 23.—Rev. William G. McLaren, General Superintendent of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protective Association and one of the chief advocates of an absolute ban on dancing in McMinnville, recently left town hastily under the protection of Marshal Snodgrass.

Rev. McLaren's chauffeur went with him.

As the pair sped away in their automobile to a safer retreat after each had barely escaped a ducking by irate citizens in a pond in the city park, they left the whole town in a high state of excitement.

School Girls Alleged Immoral

Business men and other prominent citizens were standing about the streets discussing the latest developments in the fight over whether there is to be absolute elimination of public dances or whether the dances are to continue under strict censorship, and at the same time a group of boys was searching for Councilman Gilbert, who, according to a letter from a local minister, made charges that the majority of the girls in the high school were immoral.

At a meeting the dance issue was thrashed out for the last time before it went to the voters at the elections for a final decision. And it was at this meeting that the trouble started.

Walter L. Toose, Jr., speaking for the dance control and censorship faction, has just finished making a reply to charges Rev. McLaren had made at a meeting here, when Rev. McLaren rose from the audience and attempted to address the thousand persons who had assembled in the auditorium.

The meeting had already been brought to a close. The audience at once indicated its resentment.

Start for Pond

Rev. McLaren persisted in his attempt to repeat the charges he already had made. Then several prominent citizens seized the reformer and started with him toward the pond. They had proceeded but a short distance when the Marshal headed off the party and rescued him.

While the meeting was being held Rev. McLaren's chauffeur was at the

entrance of the auditorium, distributing handbills advocating the elimination of all public dances in the city.

Chauffeur Also is Seized

The chauffeur, whose name was not learned, according to bystanders, declared that McMinnville dances had caused the downfall of several girls. This alleged statement aroused the crowd, who immediately seized the chauffeur and started out with him for the pond.

Again the marshal arrived on time and rescued the chauffeur. Under the officer's escort Rev. McLaren and the chauffeur were started in the direction of Newberg. When last seen they were headed that way in an automobile.

It was stated on good authority that the men who participated in the demonstrations against the outsiders were prominent citizens.

Montana County Aids Fight Upon 'Hoppers'

MISSOULA, Mont., June 23.—County commissioners of Missoula county are prepared to aid in the fight against the grasshopper. The commissioners announced recently that they would meet, dollar for dollar, up to \$3000, subscriptions by reservation farmers to clear the county of insect pests. Funds for the county's part of the war budget will be raised through a half-mill levy, it was stated. The commissioners recently visited the reservation and report that bad conditions are expected this summer in connection with the probable grasshopper invasion.

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
