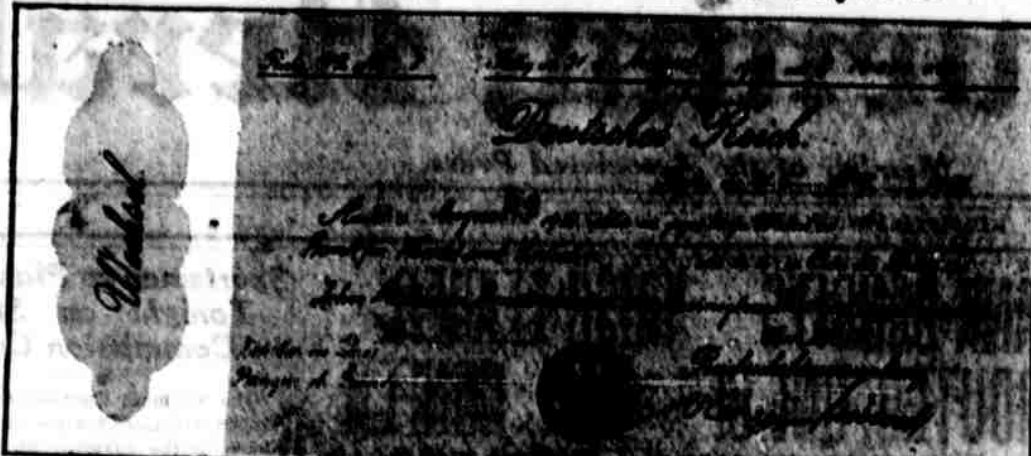

OREGON MAY GET ONE MORE SEAT IN CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, D. C. June 27.—Reapportionment of congress and a possible increase of Oregon's congressional delegation by one seat seems assured.

The house committee on census smoked into activity by the action of Congressman McArthur of Oregon and Harbour of California, who threatened to have caucus action unless the committee met today, appointed a subcommittee to hear all the evidence on the subject and to report back to the full committee not later than June 29 after which it is expected the bill for reapportionment will be reported to the house.

It is the expectation the number of congressmen will be limited to 435, but the pressure is heavy to add a few more.

The subcommittee is composed of Fairfield of Indiana, Towns of Iowa, Langley of Kentucky, Larsen of Georgia and Brinson of North Carolina.

Langell Valley May Start Irrigation Work This Season

Langell Valley and Horsefly Irrigation district directors Saturday ratified the tentative contract submitted by the government for furnishing water from Clear Lake for irrigation. The contract will be returned to the reclamation bureau, made specific, and sent back for submission to the residents of the district at election. If it is then ratified work is expected to start this fall, and water will be on the land next spring.

H. D. Newell, local project manager, said Clear Lake could be counted on to supply water for 10,000 acres, with a maximum capacity for 12,000.

Whether the Horsefly source will be developed this year is speculative, depending, Harry Holgate, district counsel for the reclamation service, informed the board upon the availability this year of \$200,000 which congress has authorized expended on the work.

IRRIGATION BOARD MEETS

Directors of the Klamath Irrigation district met Saturday evening, with H. D. Newell, project manager, and Harry Holgate, district counsel present. Many matters affecting the district were discussed, but no definite action, according to the secretary.

COUNCIL MEET TONIGHT

The common council will meet this evening at the city hall at the usual hour for the transaction of city matters. One of the items which will be brought up tonight will be the seven new paving units accompanied with the specifications complete in detail and the introduction of an emergency ordinance amending the city charter so as to permit the sewer bonds to cover a 30 year period instead of the present ten and 20 year limitation. This amendment it is said, will permit the immediate sale of the bonds for this needed improvement in many parts of the city.

6 Millions State Irrigation Bonds

SALEM, Or., June 27.—Some idea of the vast amount of irrigation development now in progress in Oregon may be gained from a report issued here today by Percy A. Cupper, state engineer, showing that up to the present time the outstanding bonds of these irrigation districts aggregated \$6,660,500, while the bonds voted by these projects but not yet disposed of, totaled \$10,331,500.

The state, under the irrigation laws, has agreed to pay interest on irrigation bonds aggregating \$4,042,500 for a period of 2 1/2 years, requiring a total issue of state securities during that time of \$600,000.

Mr. Cupper estimates that approximately \$75,000.00 would be required to complete the reclamation of lands now included in organized irrigation districts in the state.

Water Power Will Be Developed Soon

WASHINGTON, D. C. June 27.—Dr. George Otis Smith, as director of the United States geological survey, is officially in charge of the study of the country's water resources. He is in favor of the development of the nation's water-power resources, which would bring cheap power to hundreds of communities which now lack it.

Favors Development.

"There is no doubt that the country in general is ready to give practical attention to the control development and utilization of its rivers," he said in a statement to the press.

"If the people could only be made to understand that the control and utilization of rivers means millions of dollars to them and offers one of the greatest economic advantages that can be taken of the natural resources they would not be slow in approving plans for river development. Not only such development as looks merely to flood prevention—although this in itself would save billions of dollars—but development that will provide a uniform flow for rivers and streams by which power could be generated that could be brought within the reach of hundreds of communities which do not have it now.

Great Saving Possible.

"The development of water-power of the rivers of the country is going to be one of the great achievements the United States will see in the next few years. It will be a saving to the people so great that it cannot now be fully comprehended. In the East we are learning that our rivers can serve us best when harnessed up with our great steam power plants."
