Meadow Lake Mill Running Full Force

Marion Nine, lumber operator, was a visitor here Saturday and stated that a force of 24 men were employed in the cleanup of the approximated cut of 2,000,000 feet of lumber at Meadow Lake.

Eight men are employed in the woods, while 16 are in service at the mill. Mr. Nine stated that the prevailing wage scale ran from 35 cents an hour for common labor to \$1 for sawyers. He also added that under present conditions, operations would last at least two months. About 25,000,000 feet of lumber are still to be cut in the Nine holdings whenever business conditions justify the expense.

Seek Price Data From Other Towns

James Stevens, Ross Nickerson and Lee Bean, members of the restaurant, laundry, barber, labor and room rent committee selected at the mass meeting June 17 to secure information relative to prices within 100 miles radius of this city have sent communications to the secretaries of the labor councils in the cities of La Grande, Baker City, Bend, Oregon, and Taft and Coalinga, California, requesting information.
