CALIFORNIA NEWS

SAN FRANCISCO—War not only on bootleggers, but also on authorized manufacturers of liquor who are under suspicion of illegitimately furnishing it to the blind piggers, was declared at the custom house after H. Forrest Mitchell took his oath of office as prohibition director and joined forces with John Exnicio, the new prohibition enforcement official.

GRASS VALLEY—No progress has been made in arriving at a settlement of the mine wage controversy and negotiations are apparently at an end, at least temporarily. While no public announcement has been made, it is well known that the mine operators have declined to consider the 50-cent cut voted by the Mine Workers' Protective league.

REDDING—The result of co-operation among Shasta county fruit growers is seen in a pronounced way when the first carload shipment of fruit ever made from Happy Valley went forward to Seattle. The shipment was made by the Happy Valley Fruit and Berry association, which was organized in the valley less than a month ago. The car contained 1,180 boxes of peaches and plums. The estimated value of the fruit is \$2,500.

SACRAMENTO—The preservation of cherries in fresh condition for one year by a new cold storage process has been practically demonstrated by experiments recently completed at the University of California by E. L. Overholser, W. V. Cruess and S. A. Bjarnason. Fresh cherries were retained frozen in diluted sugar solutions, with their original color, flavor and appearance unchanged.

SACRAMENTO—Suicides have taken a decided increase in California. This is shown by figures compiled by L. E. Ross, director of the bureau of vital statistics of the state board of health, for the first four months of 1921. According to Ross 214 persons took their own lives in the state during that period. President Harding repeatedly have declared for the principle of exempting American ships from the payment of tolls for using the canal, powerful influences are building up in opposition. For this reason, Senator Borah, chairman of the senate committee on inter-oceanic canals, proposes to call up his bill exempting coastwise American ships from toll payment. His committee has unanimously reported this measure to the senate.

While the senate probably will pass the bill in relatively short order, and while the house is generally favorable to tolls exemption, it is altogether probable that the law ultimately to be passed will be based on a theory contrary to the principle of the Borah bill.

Representative Edmonds of Pennsylvania, a member of the house committee on merchant marine and fisheries, a devoted friend of opening the canal free to American merchant ships, has introduced a bill to the same end that is calculated to remove British and other alien objections to thus favoring American ships.
