

NEWS FROM THE STATE CAPITAL

SALLEM, Or., July 1.—The Oregon school for the deaf closed its term of school Friday. A remarkable exhibit of the work of the students in domestic science and the manual arts was on display for the public at the school Tuesday.

July 12 is the date that has been set by the state board of control to open bids for construction of the new wing at the Eastern Oregon state hospital for the insane at Pendleton. The cost is estimated at \$163,000.

Blank forms have been mailed by Secretary of State Koser to owners of aircraft in Oregon for purposes of registration and license. The license fee is \$10. The law is a new one that became effective May 25, and few owners so far have made their applications.

On Tuesday night of last week the state was presented an Army siege gun by Sedgwick post, G. A. R., of Salem. The gun recently came from one of the federal forts and has been placed in the state capitol grounds.

Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, has apportioned among the thirty-six counties a total of \$62,041.95, representing one-twentieth of a mill tax on the assessed valuation of property in the state, for county fairs, land product shows, livestock exhibitions and roads. It is provided by law.

The industrial accident commission has made public the new schedule of rates for injured laborers under the workmen's compensation act that will be effective July 1. The schedule of rates per month follows:

- Single man—Minimum, \$20; maximum, \$55.
- Man and wife—Minimum, \$40; maximum, \$65.
- Man, wife and one child—Minimum, \$40; maximum, \$73.
- Man, wife and two children—Minimum, \$40; maximum, \$81.
- Man, wife and three children—Minimum, \$40; maximum, \$89.
- Man, wife and four children—Minimum, \$40; maximum, \$97.

Notwithstanding litigation that has been instituted in the circuit court of Polk county to stop state highway work in that county, construction work will proceed until a restraining order is issued by the court.

At a meeting Wednesday the new state bond commission, composed of the governor, the state treasurer and the chairman of the state industrial accident commission, was formally organized. The first official action was to invest \$49,000 of state money in 6 per cent school district bonds. The bonds purchased were district No. 21, Marion county, \$2500; district No. 14, Lake county, \$20,000; district No. 1, Klamath county, \$17,500.

No irrigation districts have defaulted in the payment of interest on their bonds. A statement to this effect was made by State Engineer Cupper because of an impression to the contrary arising from the issue of \$121,275 state bonds to pay the interest. This issue is under a law of the 1910 session whereby the state may guarantee interest for any one or more of the first five years of a district's existence.

During the absence of Governor Picott at Camp Lewis, Senator Roy W. Ritner of Pendleton served the amendment whereby the president of the senate is the governor's successor in event of his absence, removal or other inability to act. Governor Ritner officiated in the executive chair for the first time. His only official act was to conduct a hearing on requisition of the governor of Massachusetts for the extradition of Sam Segal, wanted in Boston on a charge of non-support. It was found that the governor did not have jurisdiction for the reason that Segal is under an indictment in Portland. The Portland charge is polygamy.

The public service commission does not have authority to relieve a railroad from its status as a common carrier, according to an opinion of the attorney general. The road must apply to the legislature. The question applies to some short logging roads in the state.

The Grants Pass irrigation district has applied to the state irrigation securities commission for certification of \$325,000 in bonds. Previously bonds for the district in the sum of \$865,000 have been approved.

A report submitted to F. A. Elliott, state forester, by A. J. Jaenicke, of the United States forest service, shows that over a period of the last ten years damage aggregating \$4,500,000 has been done to timber in Northern California and Southern Oregon by the pine beetle. Of this amount \$1,500,000 applies to federally owned land and \$3,000,000 to privately owned timber. A state law has been passed to alleviate the pest and a bill to the same end will be introduced in congress by Senator McNary.

Certain new rules and regulations relative to fire prevention are being worked out by A. C. Barber, state fire marshal, and his deputies, under a law which becomes operative July 1.
