Hunting and Fishing License Receipts So Far \$3077 for 1921

Total cash receipts from the sale of hunters and anglers licenses since the beginning of the year are \$3,077, according to a compilation made by the county clerk. Bources of recoipte are as follows: resident huntore, \$94.50; reledent englere, \$1. 422.50; resident combination hunting and angling, \$1,817; non-resident angiers, \$197; hunters, 16 to 18 years, \$7.50; anglers, same ages, 38.50.

No non-resident hunting licenses have been sold.

Residents licenses were raised from \$1.50 for both anglers and hunters to \$8.00 each on Pebruary 21, 1921. Combination licenses were raised from \$3.00 to \$5.00. Anglers licenses for non-residents are the same price as their respective states charge for non resident anglers Ifsenses. Non resident hunters licenses Are \$10.00.
