Even lined up in automobiles on the street and craned their necks over the top of fence, Tuesday, Man alive—that type of sport was what kept the arena from being full. Kids can be overlooked but not 16 year olds up. It made me think of the barroom sport who drank whiskey when the other paid but turned to the bartender on his turn and said, 'three beers.' That type was the class who sponged off the two day card here."

5 ARE SHOT TO
DEATH, IRELAND

BELFAST, July 6.—Five men were taken from their homes in Newry, south of here, today, and shot, and their bodies left in a heap by the roadside. A school teacher was shot and killed yesterday while attempting to shield his brother from attack.

The train from Londonerry was wrecked last night, the rails having been removed. There were no casualties. Cars carrying Belfast goods were burned.

LONDON, July 6.—General Smuts, South African premier, upon his return from Ireland after conferences with De Valera and other Irish republicans, conferred with Lloyd George, Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier, and others. The conference is understood to have concerned the possible suspension of hostilities in Ireland.

Non-Partisan Leaguers
In Row; Paper Makes
Charge of Corruption

FARGO, N. D., July 6.—Charges that three members of the state executive committee of the non-partisan league had squandered \$50,000 of the league's recall election campaign fund were made in a special edition of the Fargo Courrier-News, the non-partisan league daily newspaper, here today. The edition was not allowed to go into circulation. Two committee members, apprised of the intention of the editor to issue the edition, appeared at the office at 4:15 this morning, took nearly all the papers to the city dump and burned them. Plates and matrices were also destroyed.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—Despite diplomatic protest, Attorney General Daugherty today upheld the ruling of his predecessor that alcoholic liquors cannot be transported across the United States territory from one foreign country to another.
