Referee Gillan called North a winner in the middle of the round.

The semi-windup was scheduled to go six rounds between Eddle Miller of Los Angeles and Kid Herrera, a nephew of the famous Aurella Herrera. For four rounds, the two tried to land a ten spot but round after round showed Herrera up to better advantage and Referee Watters made a wise decision in calling Herrera a victor in that round as Miller was out of the game, with too much altitude and Herrera running him ragged.

The main drawing card was the ten round bout between Joe Fox of San Francisco and Billy Huff of Chiloquin, both welterweights. The bout ended in the fifth round when Huff saw an opening and shot a right to the jaw that dropped his opponent for the count but there was no count, as Fox's seconds threw up the sponge on the count of five.

This bout started off with a snap. Fox landing the first blow and following that the two mixed it lively throughout the round. At the beginning of the second, it was noticed that although Fox was doing the leading, and forcing the fighting. Huff was wily enough to stay out of range of Fox's jabs and swings. At the close of this round, the spec tators realized that the high altitude had taken Fox's wind and as he started in the third round with a rush which kept Huff on the defensive. It was clearly seen that Fox was making his supreme effort to secure a "kayo" for his wind was fast going. .

Round four was all Huff's as he was evasive and after 45 seconds of defensive work rushed Fox off his feet with a deluge of straight arm punches and uppercuts. At the clo of this round, Fox was all but out. The end came after 30 seconds after the fifth round opened with a futile swing by Fox allowed his left jaw wide open and Huff with an uppercut sent Fox down for good. Fox was game to the end and even in the fourth round was in no condition to battle longer but he had stated earlier in the day that he would try to please the fans as long as he could swing an arm-and he lived


