The member of the commission, preferably the president shall personally investigate the record of each fighter who is selected and he shall assure himself upon the appearance that the man is who he represents himself to be. The president shall conduct the correspondence and make his report to the public before the contest begins. The promotion end shall be closely scrutinized and every effort made to see that proper quarters for the boxers are provided. These facts are the ones that seemed to be the main ideas of the fans who expressed themselves at all on the question but each and every one stated that all they wanted was a "run for their money."

The question of a permanent boxing commission has been discussed and it is said that a move is now being considered to secure the approval of the present commission.
