

BANDIT SLAIN BY POSSE; TWO WOMEN RESCUED

HOOD RIVER, July 8.—Mrs. J. T. Miller and daughter, Pearl, are today recovering from a nervous collapse, resulting from being kidnaped Wednesday by Luther Fagan, ex-convict, who was shot to death by Herman Pregarre, civilian posseman.

Fagan shot and wounded J. T. Miller at the latter's ranch near here, and carried Mrs. Miller and her son and daughter captive to a nearby grove. The attack on Miller followed his refusal to divulge to Fagan the whereabouts of Louise Watkins, daughter of Mrs. Millen, for attack upon whom Fagan was sentenced to the penitentiary in 1919.

Fagan held a posse at bay two hours, threatening the lives of his captives, if an attempt was made to capture him. He was lured to approach the posse, shielded by the girl's body, to receive \$50, offered for the release of the boy. As Fagan was about to take the money Pregarre saw an opportunity and fired blowing the top of the ex-convicts head off. Fagan was recently paroled.

LIGHTHOUSE KEEPER LIKES JOBS; ABHOR VACATIONS

SAN FRANCISCO, July 8.—Vacations on full pay are extremely unpopular with lighthouse-keepers, according to H. W. Rhodes, superintendent of lighthouses for the California coast. Although they are given 30 days every year on full pay, just like other government employees, most of them come back to work in ten or 15 days. Rhodes says that they either have not sufficient money for a full vacation or else they tire of inaction.

WILL MOVE TAHOE LIGHT

SAN FRANCISCO, July 8.—Lake Tahoe's one lighthouse is to be moved from Rubicon Point, two miles from Emerald Bay to Sugar Pine Point, four miles nearer the terminus of the railroad at Tahoe City. The light was first built at Rubicon Point at the request of resort owners, so as to furnish a general guide to locations, but experience proved that a light to warn boats away from the dangerous shoals at Sugar Pine Point was more necessary. In its new location the station will be visible from more resorts on the lake, according to H. W. Rhodes, lighthouse superintendent for California.

STIFFER QUARANTINE

WHITTIER, Cal. July 8.—Canadian authorities, as well as officials in Lower California have agreed to California's suggestion for closer cooperation with Pacific coast states in the matter of more rigid quarantine restrictions to combat insect pests and plant diseases, according to an announcement made here recently before the summer session of the California citrus institute by Dr. G. H. Hecke, director of the California state department of agriculture. Dr. Hecke recently returned from British Columbia where, he says, he enlisted the support of Canadian crop officials in the crop pest fight. He was delegated by Governor Stephens of California to take necessary steps to this end.
