## OREGON BREVITIES

**PENDLETON.**—In all probability the department encampment of the Spanish War Veterans will be held in Pendleton next year, for D. C. Bowman, delegate from Malabon post to the state encampment to be held in Astoria July 15 and 16, will go with the intention of securing it. It is said that this encampment would bring about 5000 people to Pendleton.

**DALLAS.**—A skin grafting operation was done at the Dallas hospital to save the life of little Mary Penner, who was terribly burned several weeks ago when her clothing caught fire from the kitchen stove at her home. The little girl's father, John Penner, gave 45 square inches of his own skin for the operation without taking an anesthetic.

**ALBANY.**—A fair, established originally as an industrial boys' and girls' club exhibit at Shedd, will grow this year into a community fair, which will feature exhibits of farm products and household work as well. Exhibits by the boys' and girls' clubs at Shedd will continue to be an important part of the fair. The fair will be held September 23.

**PORTLAND.**—Elimination of all-day parking of automobiles in the area roughly bounded by Front, Tenth, Madison and Couch streets was agreed to yesterday by members of the city council. It was also agreed that left-hand turns would not be permitted in the district bounded by Third, Stark, Yamhill streets and Broadway.

**NEWBERG.**—The committee in charge of the campaign to raise an additional endowment fund for Pacific college to the amount of \$150,000 a few days ago received a subscription from Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce. Mr. Hoover was a student of the academic department there in his boyhood days.

**BEND.**—More than 5000 sheep have been dipped at Crescent in the last few days as a requisite to being admitted into the Deschutes National forest, reports Jack Horton, forest grazing examiner on his return to Bend from Crescent.

**SALEM.**—The stopping of a train on the Oregon Electric so that a passenger might return to the statehouse

a number of keys which he had carried away unintentionally, was said to have established a precedent in the operation of carriers in this section of the state.

**LA GRANDE.**—Just before leaving Baker late Wednesday night, a woman rushed on the train with a basket and deposited it on a seat beside Peter Nelson of this city, getting off as the train started. The basket contained a baby girl of 10 days with a tag on which the name was given as "Eunice L. R." asking that it be taken to the Waverly baby home in Portland. Indications are that the baby comes from a wealthy family. The infant has been placed in a local home by the Red Cross.

**LA GRANDE.**—A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Mrs. Ella Rynearson, wealthy 70-year-old farm owner, charging her with reckless driving. In turning a corner, to avoid crashing into another machine, she drove through a heavy plate glass window in a furniture store. A range, weighing 600 pounds, which was on exhibition in the window, was hurled half way across the store when the car struck it and a number of pieces of furniture were demolished. No one was injured.
