RUSH FOR THE NORTHERN OIL FIELDS OPENS

EDMONTON, Alta., July 14.—The rush to stake all claims in the Fort Norman, Northwest Territories, fields has begun in earnest and each day now sees the tide of fortune seekers sweeping northward from Edmonton, Fort McMurray, Peace River Crossing and other points. The marchers also include scores of experienced mineral prospectors bound for the sub-Arctic in quest of gold.

Every town, hamlet, trading post and river is squirming with activity of men striving desperately to be the first into the Arctic with the backing of the ice in the Great Slave Lake. Not since the gold rush of 1897 to the Klondike and Alaskan gold fields has there been such an immense migration.

But the odyssey of the Yukon is being rewritten in the present rush in terms of modern transportation. The oil seekers making their way north travel in modern sleeping cars to the end of the northern railways and

thence in comfortable river steamers and motor launches. One Canadian oil company is sending its scouting parties into the territories in all metal airplanes.

The moment the traveller leaves the river highway however, he is face to face with the still unconquered north. Portages must be negotiated with great hardships for those who are transporting heavy oil machinery. They get a taste of the once frightful "Edmonton trail" to Dawson city—the grimtest joke of the gold-seeking northland, where men died by the scores or went raving mad, and where the survivors who finally struggled through arrived at the Alaskan goldfields one to two years late.

But men have learned the perils of the north since then and have taken advantage of the experience. Royal Canadian Mounted Police will not permit persons to leave the "jumping off" places in the north this time unless they are physically fit, properly equipped for a year's stay in the north country, and well supplied with funds.

The two chief ports of entry into the north are Peace River, about 200 miles northwest of Edmonton, and Fort McMurray, almost an equal distance due north.

DELAY DIPPING 40,000 SHEEP

By delaying dipping, apparently in the belief that the rules in the campaign against scab may be forgotten, sheepmen in northern Lake county are losing approximately half the time during which the summer range might be used, says Dr. R. A. Parsons, bureau of animal industry representative. Not one of 40,000 head which must be dipped before entering the national forest has been given curative or preventive treatment for the disease, he states.

Notification was given the sheepmen of northern Lake county on April 1. Now, however, dipping could not possibly be finished before July 20, especially as no tanks have been constructed.

To date, Dr. Parsons has superintended the dipping of 42,000 Deschutes county sheep. Twelve thousand in the county remain to be dipped, a task which should be completed by July 17.

Dr. Parsons expressed fear that it may be impossible to eradicate the disease this year, since a number of stockmen controlling private range show no indication of desiring to treat diseased or exposed animals. Users of government range must dip before crossing the forest boundary. If there is considered any danger of infection.—Bend Bulletin.

BLIND LAWYER WILL TEACH IN UNIVERSITY.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 14.—George W. Nix, a blind lawyer here, has been added to the faculty of the College of Law of the University of Southern California here, and will combine his work as an instructor with his practice. It is claimed that he can recite the California Civil Code and the Code of Civil Procedure, and can refer to chapter and page, and to such decisions as bear on the sections quoted.

Mr. Nix relies on his memory because he is blind. He was a miner, nine years ago, and lost his sight in a mine accident; he came here, read law in the school where he is now a professor, was admitted, and practices successfully.

Wireless Expert Plans Radio Use In Catastrophes

DENVER, Colo., July 14.—Plans to prevent the cutting off of any community from communication with the outside world by floods or similar disasters are being worked out by H. H. Buckwalter of Denver, a wireless telegraphy expert. According to Buckwalter, the plan is to be put in statewide operation and will consist of several members in every community in the state organizing to communicate with adjoining communities by any possible means.

"The plan is to utilize every possible means of communication without wires," Mr. Buckwalter explained. "If there is a repetition of the Pueblo disaster and the ordinary means of communication are rendered useless, several persons in the isolated area can send out distress signals and calls for help to the surrounding country. Wireless telephone and telegraph sets, of course will be the principal equipment. Plans for constructing small emergency sets are being prepared and will be sent out to all parts of the state. The material can be obtained at any garage."

In a recent series of tests, a party went out about twenty miles from Denver with a small crystal receiving set. They carried a short piece of wire which was shot over a tree by means of a bow and arrow, and received wireless messages from Denver. They replied with an automobile spotlight, equipped with a sending

Harding Wants Action From the Law-Makers

WASHINGTON, July 14.—There will be no reapportionment at the special session of congress and it will have to go over to the regular session which convenes in December.

President Harding is against any consideration of this question now and has sent word to this effect to Senator Curtis, Republican whip, and to the leaders in the house.

The president is anxious to have congress finish up the tariff, revise the internal revenue tax laws and then go home.

He wants as early an adjournment as possible and would like to have all other matters of legislation go over till the regular session.

This means that the fight between the Eastern states which have lost population and correspondingly congressional seats and the Western states which have gained in population and are entitled to new additional congressmen will be postponed for the time being.
