SACRAMENTO—That frightful conditions exist among the Indians of Shakiyou, Modoc, Shasta and Lassen Counties to the disgrace "of our American civilization," is the conclusion reached by Dr. Allen F. Gillman, District Health Officer of the State Board of Health.

He submitted to the State Board of Health a voluminous report on a two-months investigation of conditions among the Indians of the Northeastern part of the State.

Large Telescope for Arizona Observatory

TUSCON, Ariz., July 14.—Studies of Mars and the effects of solar activity on the earth will be made at the new Steward Observatory which is being installed at the University of Arizona here. Members of the university faculty say the altitude and atmosphere of this part of southern Arizona are particularly well adapted to astronomical research.

The large telescope which will be the feature of the observatory will be shipped here from New York, not later than July 30 according to Dr. R. B. von Klein Smid, president of the university, who recently went east to inspect the apparatus. The six inch perfected lens for the telescope is being shipped from Buffalo, N. Y. Officials say the observatory will be the best equipped in the southwest.

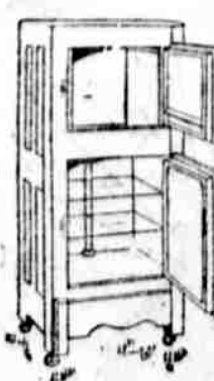
