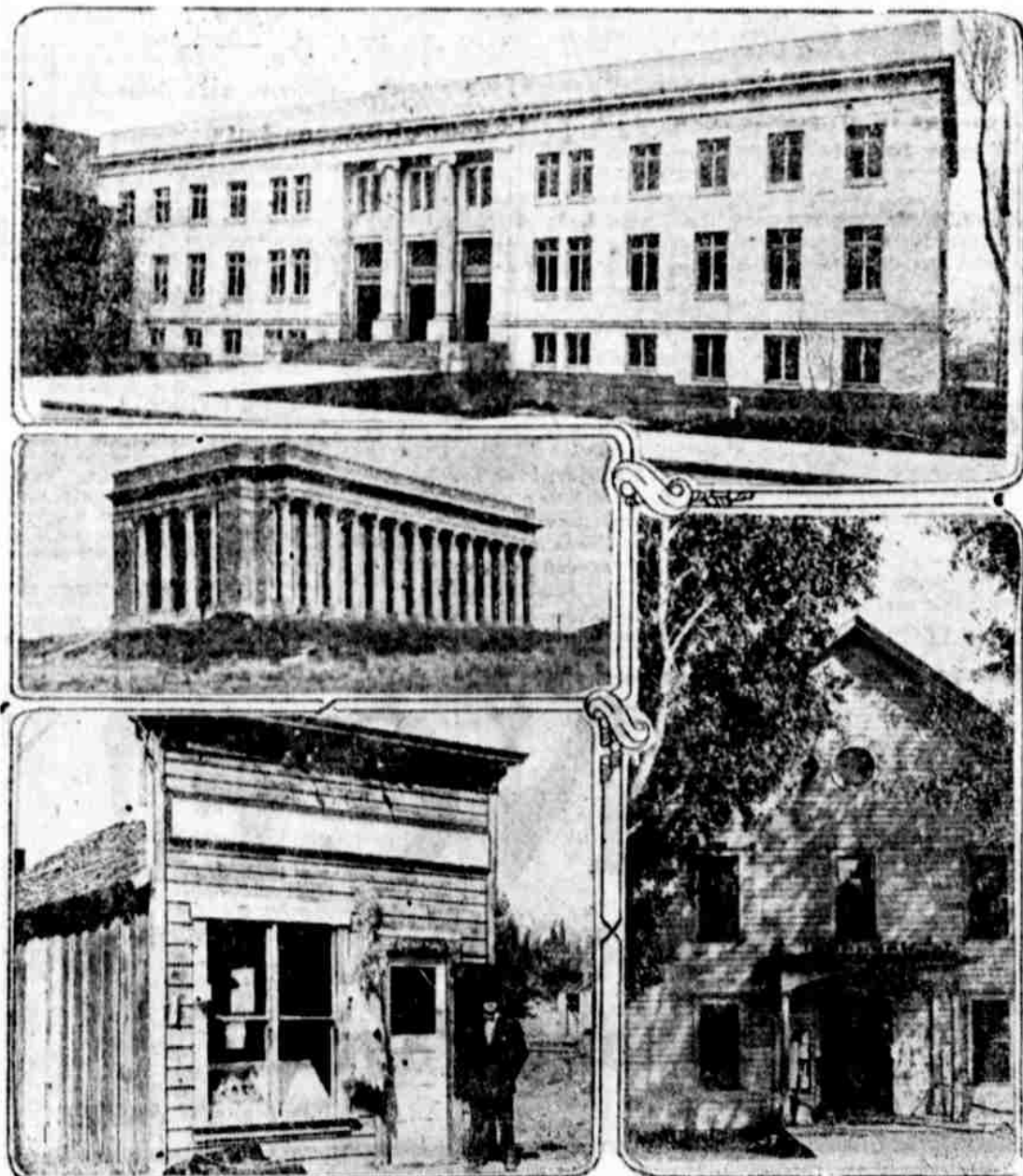

TODAY IS AN ANNIVERSARY IN COURTHOUSE LITIGATION JUDGE HAMILTON DECIDED DOUGAN CASE A YEAR AGO

BELOW is a flock view of Klamath county courthouses. The photos were furnished by the Stinson Studio of this city and are printed through the courtesy of the Sacramento Bee. It was developed from a negative in Mr. Stinson's collection labelled "Klamath County's first Courthouse," and is said to have stood near the present corner of Fifth and Main streets.



Today marks another milestone in the troublous trail of Klamath county courthouse litigation. One year ago today, from the circuit court bench at Roseburg, Judge J. W. Hamilton rendered a decision in favor of the county court: in the suit of Klamath county, et al, against J. M. Dougan, the contractor who built the Main street courthouse.

If Judge Hamilton had not rendered the Roseburg decision, later reversed in toto by the supreme court of Oregon, Judge Bunnell and Commissioner Short might not have been reelected county judge and commissioner of Klamath county, and the latest edict of the county court declaring the Hot Springs building the official courthouse of Klamath county would consequently have never been issued.

But backed by Judge Hamilton's decision, the incumbents staged a victorious campaign on the platform of Hot Springs courthouse completion, and today the chasm of litigation is as far as ever from being bridged over.

The decision of the supreme court, which reversed Judge Hamilton and gave the contractor, Dougan, judgment for approximately \$92,000 for building the Main street courthouse, did not issue until after the election. It practically legalized the Main street courthouse and would doubtless have greatly changed the trend of political events had it been rendered in the midst of the election campaign.

MANILA, P. I. June 14.—It costs a laborer in Manila 57 cents a day to live; according to statistics just made public by the bureau of labor. In Cebu, the second city in the Philippines, he may sustain himself on 52

cents a day and in Iloilo, the third city he requires 54 cents a day for the necessities of life.

A family of two adults and three children spend \$1.27 a day for sustenance in Manila, \$1.22 in Cebu

and \$1.23 in Iloilo. The daily wages of laborers, not including those in the government service, range from 75 cents to \$1.50 a day in Manila, 49 cents to one dollar a day in Cebu and 90 cents to \$1.50 in Iloilo.
