Blue Dissatisfied With Purse; May Not Meet Gordon

The bout that is being arranged for between Babe Blue and Sammy Gordon may not take place on August 13, as tentatively outlined, according to Blue, owing to a difficulty in the financial end. Blue yesterday afternoon said the terms offered him by the promoters were too low to justify his participation.

Blue states that he may leave this city Saturday unless some better terms are made him and, it is understood, that Gordon also expects suitable terms.

The promoters have not had any reply to the terms sent to Gordon up to date and are awaiting his answer. The promoters have a number of other men listed who are equal to the principals suggested in this tentative card and assure the fans that they will have a classy bout to produce on the date announced. The promoters also add that while many fans would like to see the return match of Blue and Gordon, still they must remain within a reasonable financial limit.

Sage Hen Season Not Open Until the First of August

Sage hen season opens in Klamath county August 1, says Wm. McNealy, secretary of the Klamath county Sportsmen's association, closing August 31. Because the season opens today in Lake county there was an erroneous impression among local sportsmen that the same date applied here. Mr. McNealy warns that sage hens shot in Lake county cannot be legally transported into Klamath during the closed season.

Will Sell Cal. Licenses here

Mr. McNealy has received word from Chas. A. Vogelsang, executive officer of the California state fish and game commission, that at the next meeting of the California commission the matter of sale of California hunting and fishing licenses in Klamath county will be taken up. Heretofore sportsmen have been unable to obtain such licenses on short notice and inconvenience and annoyed on expedition near the border by not being able to cross even with a tantalizing array of game in sight across the line.

Mr. Vogelsang's interest is the result of his attendance at the recent meeting of the Oregon fish and game commission here. It has also been agreed between the commissions of the two states that wardens may cross the line in actual pursuit of poachers. Lack of this understanding has been a protection to violators before, as they might shoot game illegally in California and escape penalty by crossing the short distance into Oregon.
