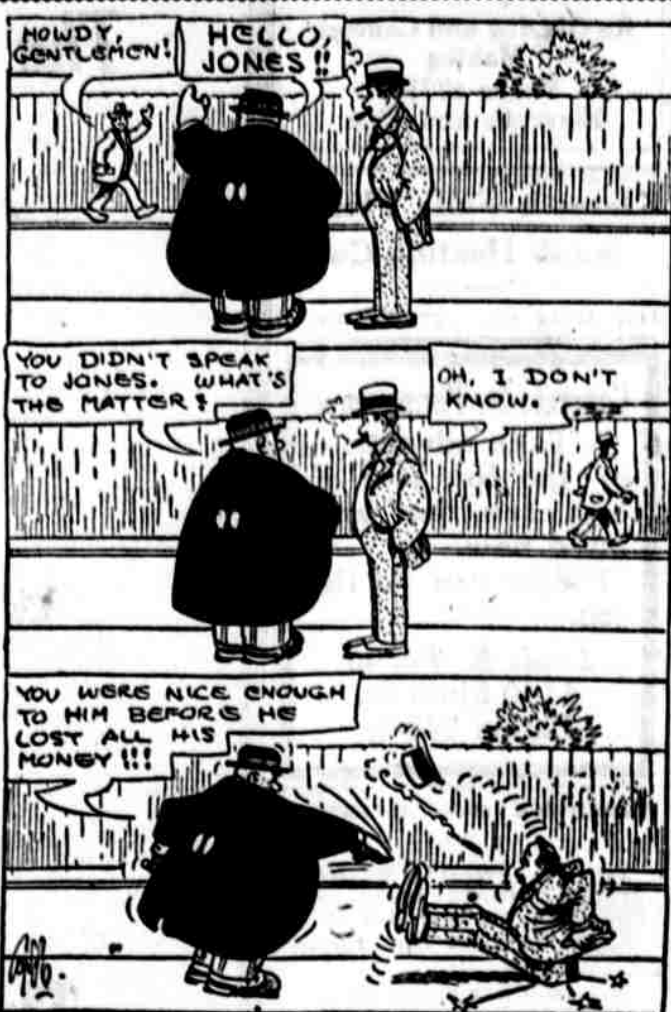

Books Do Not Last Long In Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 16.—The life of a book is a hard one in the Los Angeles public library, according to an official report. Six hundred books are taken out of circulation weekly for treatment in the mending department, keeping two attendants engaged solely at this work. Two hundred are fully rebound weekly. Repair work takes 600 pounds of paste a year. Multitilation is causing inroads in the supply of books, according to library officials, two serious classes of this being by school children who cut out portions of books for their own use, and a large number of people who write spiritual admonitions on fly-leaves apparently assuming this to be effective means of spreading their beliefs. The latter class select the books with the largest circulation for their abjurations.

PROGRAM FOR PRESS MEETING IN READINESS

HONOLULU, Territory of Hawaii, June 26.—(By Mail)—The program for the Press Congress sessions to be held here in October is taking definite shape. It includes addresses by such well-known journalists as James Wright Brown Editor & Publisher, New York; H. L. Bridgman of the Brooklyn Standard Union; K. Sugimura of the Tokyo Asahi Shimbun; B. W. Fleisher of the Japan Advertiser; Thales Coutoupis of Nea Ellas, Athens; Ludwig Saxe of Verdens Gang, Christiania; Ruston N. Vatchaghandy of Sanj Vartaman, Bombay, and Virgilio Rodriguez Beteta of the Central American Press association, Guatemala.

These men are among the journalists invited to participate in the program who have accepted the program committee's invitation. Others of equal prominence will appear in the first formal program announcement. The names of two well-known newspaper men who will be the chief representatives of England and France respectively on the program will be announced soon.

It is planned to devote four and a half or five days to the business sessions of the congress, leaving the remaining time open for the schedule arranged by the Hawaiian entertainment committees. The business sessions will consist of general meetings, when the delegates will assemble in a single body for discussion of problems affecting the entire profession and departmental conferences of first interest to only a part of the delegates. Two afternoons will be devoted to conferences on journalistic education, the newspaper press, daily and weekly, and magazine writing. The Pan-American Press conference will probably meet for an all-day session on the last day.

Prof. Walter B. Pitkin of Columbia University, and Prof. W. D. Hornaday of the University of Texas will have places on the program

of the educational conference. Their problems will have to do with training for newspaper work of all kinds. The program committee believes that the program now being arranged will be truly representative of country of the world.
