Two Awards in Each Class

Class 1—Shasta Daisy. Ten single
blooms.

Class 2—Sweet Pea. Ten single
blooms—one color.

Class 3—Sweet Pea. Collection all
varieties—one of each color.

Class 4—Rose. One single bloom.

Class 5—Rose. Collection—all
varieties one each.

Class 6—Nasturtium. Ten flow-
ers—one color.

Class 7—Nasturtium. Collection—
one of each color.

Class 8—Pansy. Collection—any
number.

Class 9—Perennials. Best bouquet
—ten of one variety.

Class 10—Perennials. Collection
—largest number of varieties.

Class 11—Annuals. Ten single
blooms.

Class 12—Annuals. Collection—
largest number of varieties.

Division 2—Collections for Decor-
ative use. Two Awards in
Class.

Class 13—"Old Fashioned Bou-
quet." Any number of any flower.

Class 14—Children's Collection.

Class 15—Best bouquet of Shasta
Daisies.
