It is also expected that the committee on national forest policy of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States will attend at least one session of the lumber manufacturers' meetings. This committee is headed by D. L. Goodwillie, of Chicago.

The program devotes the day of July 27th, to a meeting of the National Lumber Manufacturers' Association directors at the Tacoma hotel, Tacoma, July 28th, will be devoted to a meeting of the West Coast Forest Products Bureau. ## Books and Manuscripts On Oregon are Listed; Total Number 4501

SALEM, Ore., July 19. (Special).—"The Pacific Northwest Americana" is the name of a new volume of bibliography recently received by the state library, and which lists 4501 books and historical manuscripts that have been written about this part of the United States. This does not include strictly state papers and documents, verse, fiction or any other personal production that is not history.

The compiler of this volume is Charles W. Smith, assistant librarian at the University of Washington, Seattle, who obtained the list by sending out questionnaires to all the important libraries of the Pacific Northwest asking for lists of all historical works in the libraries.

The Oregon state library was able to furnish a substantial part of the

list, for Miss Cornelia Marvin, state librarian, for some time has been making a specialty of collecting books about Oregon and Oregon history. Some of the Oregon books are exceedingly rare.

"Another volume of particular interest to the student of history, which is on the shelves of the state library, is entitled "Subject Index to the History of the Pacific Northwest and Alaska." The volume mentions every important actor in the drama of the Oregon territory, mentions the literary folk and others who have attained prominence in the life of the Northwest.

Considerable incidental Oregon history is contained in a bibliographical record of all the narratives and stories of California prior to 1865. It is said that while California itself was known long before Oregon, and there are Spanish and other writings antedating anything relating to the northwest, the years between 1834, when Jason Lee came to Oregon, and 1847, when the real California story begins, produced a tremendous amount of Oregon literature.
