At the Theaters

THE STAR

The eternal clash between the mountaineers of Kentucky and the inhabitants of the valley, is thrashed out again in the Charles Maigne production of "The Kentuckians", featuring Monte Blue, the attraction at the Star Theatre tonight. The film was made from the popular novel by John Fox, Jr., and it retains the fine characterizations, the simple mountain atmosphere, the dramatic situations that abound in the book.

Monte Blue is a heroic figure as Boone Stallard, the backbone of his clan, and the only man who could quell feuds between the different families. Stallard is sent to the Kentucky legislature and early there he has a clash with Randolph Marshall of the Blue Grass country who has its own ideas about the way to rule the mountaineers.

THE LIBERTY

OREGON BREVITIES

SALEM—The Salem Kings Products company shipped its first car of dehydrated loganberries from the 1921 crop. The car was consigned to Minneapolis.

PORTLAND—Equipped with ice picks and other paraphernalia for mountain climbing, a party of 150 persons left Portland yesterday to participate in the annual Mount Hood climb under the auspices of the Mazamas.

BEND—In the second week of July, Lost lake, on the line of the Bend Sparks Lake road is still almost entirely covered with ice, early tourists report. Huge trout have been seen in a few places where the water is exposed.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene—For failure to make the required number of hours of university credit during the spring term 20 University of Oregon students will be dropped from the institution, according to Carlton E. Spencer, registrar. Fifty eight more will be placed on probation for the fall term with a chance to redeem themselves.

Farmers' Market Works Well, S. F.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—A "farmers' public market" opened here for the purpose of "eliminating the middlemen," quoted onions in 110 pound sacks at 25 cents, as against the 45-cent market quotation, and potatoes at 95 cents a box, as against the \$1.50 quotation on the outside. Housewives and other bargain seekers crowded the market throughout the day, there being some limousines noted among the many automobiles present. A group of farmers of the Santa Clara valley is conducting the market.

Other bargains were: Pears, 85 cents for a 95 pound box, as against \$1.75 on the outside; sugar, 45¢ a hundred pounds; fruit jars, \$1.25 a dozen.

The farmers complain that they are being left with much surplus fruit and produce on their hands, while the people in the cities are being charged prohibitory prices.

MCKENZIE PASS OPEN

BEND, July 20.—The McKenzie Pass highway is now open for travel. While the highway shows considerable improvement over last year it still is a road on which only an experienced driver should venture. In the unimproved sections are many sharp turns and steep pitches requiring skill to negotiate. There are also narrow spaces wide enough only for one-way traffic.
