ED. HOWE TELLS PLAIN TRUTHS

When a stranger appears in a community and, after ringing the schoolhouse bell to attract the inhabitants, proceeds to tell them how good and wise he is and how ignorant and vicious they are, I do not like the fellow. I believe neither in his superior goodness nor in his superior wisdom.

Yet this sort of thing is as common today in communities as are lice in army camps during war. No one knows the figures, but I believe that in this country today one-third of the people are in some way connected with bothering those willing to work hard tasks of mankind. And I further believe that it is largely owing to these ineffective pests that our taxes, public and private, have become staggering, while public conditions are certainly no better than they were at the appointed, natural and necessary when a far smaller number of men and women engaged in the abomination known as public welfare work.

I believe everyone with a mind capable of analysis has a very strong suspicion if not conviction, that the railroads have been ruined and rendered less effective than they might be by attempts of reformers to reform them. It is a peculiarity of public

welfare work that while the proposed benefits are always problematical, the feature of expense is never absent. And the railroad problem is entirely a financial one; rates have become so high, because of attempts of public welfare workers to lower rates, that we hear of industrious farmers sending produce to market, and not receiving sufficient returns to pay the freight charges.

The same situation exists in other lines of necessary endeavor. How earnestly we have desired, and how liberally we have paid, to provide excellent schools; yet the procession of public welfare workers to schoolhouses has been so great, and members of boards of education so open-minded when the welfare of youth is concerned, that we have made so many "improvements" that many are now saying our schools, like our railroads, have been ruined.

How earnestly we have desired the good of women! No men in history have been as gallant as the American men in protecting their women and giving them larger opportunities as proposed by the public welfare workers, yet the leading article in the current number of the Literary Digest is headed: "Is the Younger Generation in Peril?" Girls are more particularly mentioned, but, so far as the boys are concerned, we have been very industrious in providing Y. M. C. A. buildings and "uplifting by means of Boy Scout organizations. In the Digest discussion the charges allways are too much liberty; too much

idleness; and both of these have been granted because of clamoring from public welfare workers.

I believe in modest missionary work, and all my life have found much of it to commend. I have never lived in a community where the marked tendency among the ordinary citizens was not toward good morals, education, progress and help for the unfortunate. No man is so busy he has not time to instruct boys in rules to assist them in becoming good and useful citizens; I scarcely have ever known a woman not a missionary among girls; but I do not like the public welfare worker who appears in a community, and, after ringing the schoolhouse bell to attract the people, proceeds to tell them how good and wise he is, and how ignorant and vicious they are.

NEW ARCTIC OIL FIELDS

SEATTLE, Wash., July 20.—Search for oil believed to be secluded in Uncle Sam's last frontier along the Arctic along the Arctic coast from Point Barrow to the Canadian boundary line at Demarcation Point will be undertaken by two exploration parties from California, now at Nome, outfitting for the trip, according to advices here.

The existence of a "lake of oil" in the far north of Alaska was reported five years ago by a teacher at Point Barrow. Natives later described the same lake, telling of oil bubbling through the tundra in large amounts.

While this oil lake, a few miles east of Point Barrow near the Arctic coast is said to be the object of the California prospectors, it is understood they will investigate the entire Arctic slope from Point Barrow to the Canadian line, a distance of nearly 300 miles. Alaskans who have visited that region said they believed oil would be found there.

Beach coal, broken from ledges jutting out on the Arctic shores, have often been encountered along the coast, they said. Coal has been mined at Cape Lisburne and at Wainwright, southeast of Point Barrow.

If favorable offshore winds drive away the ice, the California party may reach their prospecting grounds late in July. Their trip will present many difficulties, for the ground in most places will be frozen solid under a two foot layer of sand, according to Alaskans. The country
