## HOMESEEKERS TO COME HERE AFTER HARVEST

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21.—Following the recent announcement that the date of the settlers' excursion from the middle west to Oregon had been postponed from July 19th to September 20th upon request of large numbers of homeseekers who are unable to make the trip until after harvest, the Oregon state chamber of commerce is making complete preparations for the September trip, according to announcement today.

Commercial clubs of the state have been urged to complete the listing of available lands in each community for the information of the settlers, and these listed lands will be placed in the hands of each member of the party, according to Secretary Quayle. In this way, the homeseeker will know in advance the price and description of actual tracts of land in each district in the state.

George Quayle, general secretary of the state chamber, left today on a tour of the state for the purpose of securing representatives of various districts who will assist the state chamber representative in the middle west in the work of lining up prospective settlers.

A long telegram from Omaha, requesting additional literature on Oregon for distribution among prospective settlers, stated that a large number of homeseekers are preparing to come to Oregon in September after harvest is over.
