LOCAL DIAMOND IS DEVELOPING REAL TALENT

At Modoc Park Sunday there will be another doubleheader game when the Plumbobs and the Ewaunas cross bats while the Jewels and Copcos set up one of those gentlemanly arguments which was left unfinished some days ago.

The Copco team has perhaps shown the most advancement of all the teams entered in the league for they have steadily been improving in all departments and are striving to keep up the aim of the company which they represent. In all places where a group large enough to be formed into a team can be assembled, baseball bats and equipment are supplied with the injunction, "Go to it—play the game for the sport and improve your individual health condition." Manager Thompson is keeping faith with the company in this respect and the Copco bunch are responding to the encouragement given them.

Free Seed Corn and Celery Plants May Be Had for Asking

Anyone wishing some seed corn to try out should call at the Klamath Falls creamery as there is a small amount of the following seed left for distribution: Pioneer Dent, Wells Gehu and Wells' Dakota, all three grain or field corn, and a small amount of Little Assiniboine Yellow Sweet corn.

There are a few bunches of celery plants that are large enough to transplant, of the self blanching white plume variety, which it is said should do well in this part of the country.

This seed corn and celery plant distribution is the gift of Dr. Fred Westerfeld to the people of this county who are interested in the development of the vegetable commodities which are lacking and inasmuch as Dr. Westerfeld has paid for all the seed and hired the planting of the celery done, people who are earnest in their desire to try out and report their success to him are welcome to call at the Klamath Falls creamery and secure this garden material free of all charges.
