BAD GRAIN FIRE

WASCO, July 22.—A grain fire originating from an over heated bearing on the combine harvester operating on the J. G. Medler ranch five miles northeast of Wasco Monday afternoon destroyed 150 acres of standing grain and burned 100 acres of stubble from which the threshed grain had not been gathered. The harvester was also destroyed. The grain was averaging better than 30 bushels to the acre and was covered by insurance, as was the combine.

NOTICE OF THE FILING OF THE PROPOSED ASSESSMENT ROLL IN CONNECTION WITH THE PROPOSED IMPROVEMENT OF THE ALLEY THROUGH BLOCK 16

The Common Council of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, having ascertained and determined the proportionate share for which each lot, part of lot, block, piece or parcel of land shall be liable for the cost of making the proposed improvement of the alley through Block 16; and having on the 11th day of July A. D. 1921, filed in the office of the Police Judge of said city an itemized statement thereof, which said statement is thereafter to be known as the "Proposed

Assessment roll" for such proposed improvement.

NOTICE is hereby given that said proposed assessment roll was filed on said 11th day of July, A. D. 1921, and that said common council did by resolution fix Monday the 8th day of August A. D. 1921, at the hour of 9 o'clock P. M. at the council chamber in the city hall of said city, said date being a date upon which a regular meeting of said council will be held, as the time and place for hearing and determining all objections that may be made to the assessments in such proposed assessment roll contained; and that thereafter, having heard and determined all objections, if any there should be, said common council will proceed to assess the proportionate share and part of the cost of making said proposed improvement in accordance with the benefits accruing to said each lot, part of lot, piece and parcel of property, and declare such assessment by ordinance, and creating liens in accordance with such assessment

against each specific piece of property in such assessment roll mentioned and described.

The owners of the property so found liable for a proportionate share of the cost of such improvement are hereby referred to such assessment roll on file with the police judge for detailed information as to such assessments.

The boundaries within which the property lies which has so been found liable and to be benefited by said proposed improvement, is all that property lying adjacent to the alley running through block 16, of the original town of Linkville, now city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and upon which it is proposed to make such improvement, and extending back from the sidewalk of said alley to the respective street lines bounding said block.
