States Plan Better System of Roads

Plans to unite Northeastern California, Southern Oregon and Northwestern California by a road system which will divert traffic from the east into Portland and San Francisco are being made by the Northern California Counties Association, says the Sacramento Union.

Preliminary work will be to interest county boards to supervisors in each of the states and to secure the backing of civic organizations.

Plans for road development work with Klamath Falls, Winnemucca, Reno, Susanville, Alturas and Ager as centers are underway.

Other road plans are being worked out and will be presented at the joint meeting of the Northern California Counties Association and the Northern California Supervisors Association which will be held in Alturas, September 15.

State officials from Oregon and Nevada and representatives of civic bodies interested in the development plans are expected to be present.

Mapping Campaign Against Pine Beetle

to be used in the control work but when the spring campaign begins, the men used will be instructed in the known signs of the pest and told how to eradicate it. Most of the employees who can be secured for work will undoubtedly come from the ranches adjacent to the forests and during March, April, May and June when work is not heavy on their places, they can devote their time to bug work. Not many people realize that in this way, they can lay the foundation for steady work from privately owned timber corporations as well as from small operators, making splendid side money in the bargain.

Instructions given this way by the federal government employees to local woodmen make them independent. When an emergency arises in a timbered section the private owner can at once lay his hands on a fairly skilled bug eradicator while the insect is busy and at once begin a campaign to check the pest before far reaching destruction is worked on the forest region. The forces which would necessarily have to be despatched by the government are released to other sections where a dangerous situation exists and only a small number of the federal men are necessary in a threatened local community.

The private owners of timber are the ones who will benefit directly under this educational scheme of Uncle Sam and it will be to their interests now to look over their employees who would be suitable to work in the coming spring campaign. Uncle Sam has at all times been willing to do his part for any community in a distressing period but at the same time, "the big boy" expects the little boy to do his own part in protecting himself. From the skillful manner in which this coming campaign is being laid out and the provisions made, which are not at all compulsory on the part of the entomological bureau, to dispense education gratis to prevent future calamities in the very business blood of this section, the private owners of timber will do well to jump into the harness and assist the forestry department with every
