

HIGHWAY BODY PARTY TO MANY COURT ACTIONS

SALEM, Or., July 25.—Half a dozen cases of litigation to which the state highway commission is party are now pending in the courts.

Aside from the Warren Brothers patent cases, probably the most important of these is the controversy in Polk county which has grown out of routing of the West Side Pacific highway.

Two contracts were entered into by the commission and the Polk county court. One involves the construction of the road from Mouth south to a point near Lucklamute river. This is being graded by the commission for the county and is being paid for by the county with market road funds, the road being designated as a market road. The plaintiffs, Ernest Zilesch and others, seek to enjoin this and challenge the contract as illegal and void. They claim the road must be built by the county court.

Challenge Contract
The other contract is grading from the end of the above-mentioned road to connect with the Benton county line, grading of the road from Rickreall to Holmes Gap and the finishing of grading on the Salem-Dallas highway. The county has the money to complete the grading and part of the money for the other two roads.

The county court is borrowing money from the state under a recent legislative act to complete the work. The plaintiffs challenge this contract as illegal and void on grounds that it involves the contracting of a debt by the county in excess of \$5000, which it is claim-

ed is a violation of the state constitution.

Also the plaintiffs challenge the authority of the highway commission to build that road or the market road on grounds that it is part of the Pacific highway and that the route selected is different from the route designated by the legislature. It is averred that the commission is without authority to change the route.

Moody Takes Appeal

Another important case is that of the highway commission against Malcolm Moody of Wasco County, which Mr. Moody has appealed to the supreme court. Moody seeks to enjoin the commission from locating and improving on his land a connecting road to give access for the new bridge across the Deschutes river which was opened last September.

"The opening of the road makes it unnecessary for travelers to pay tolls to cross a private bridge owned by Moody and his claim is that he will be damaged. Judge Wilson held against Moody in the lower court and he appealed.

Damages Asked

A damage suit by J. W. Morton and children of Hood River was instituted in Multnomah county against A. D. Kern, a contractor, and the commission, but has been transferred to Hood River county. The plaintiffs claim damages of \$13,725 because earth and rock east outside of the right of way along a portion of the Columbia River highway have damaged their property. The case is now in the circuit court for Hood River county. The commission claims the land is not of great value and that if it is damaged at all, the damage is slight.

Morton and his children are defendants in a condemnation suit by the commission in Hood River county to procure additional land along the right of way of the Columbia River highway to widen the road and retain its slope.

Lane Land Needed

In Lane county a condemnation suit has been instituted against

The latest development of the Warren patent case is Judge Wolverton's overruling a motion of Oskar Huber, defendant in the case, to have the case transferred from the equity to the law side of the court where the case could be heard before a jury. An answer is now being prepared in the case by the defendant.

Further condemnation proceedings are in prospect to obtain additional ground in the program of conserving scenery along the rights of way of state highways.

SECRETARY DENBY COMING WEST ABOUT AUG. 1.

WASHINGTON, July 25.—Secretary of the Navy Denby, who is to visit Portland, Astoria and the Columbia river, as well as the naval base site near Astoria, has had to delay his trip to the Pacific for several reasons. One of the most important is the series of bombing tests, now coming to a close, which sought to test the relative superiority of air-
