

# MAIL IT EARLY ENTREATS P. O.

The postoffice department of Klamath Falls had an improvement in its service recently, due to the explanation given the public by the Herald in an article dealing with delayed first class mail matter, and a number of patrons have found by inquiring at the general delivery window that mail long missing was awaiting a claimant.

John McCall, assistant postmaster, stated that it still required education to secure the assistance of the banks and department stores to meet their letters written in the forenoon in the city mail boxes at noon, but some had complied.

Letters posted at noon are worked up that afternoon and many city patrons receive the matter the same afternoon it is posted, doing a double service. The postoffice dispatches the work when plenty of time is to be had for proper distribution and the merchant received the benefits ahead of time.

But the majority of merchants still adhere to the policy of sending their mail after 5 o'clock and from that time to the time of the arrival of the evening train—the clerks are crowded to properly dispatch it. When the train arrives the crush of incoming mail takes precedence over the local mail, and its distribution is left until later on.

Mr. McCall calls attention to the following benefits from a general habit of mailing all matter as early in the day as possible. Business will be expedited, sometimes making a difference of one entire day in the delivery of mail at its destination. Congestion of work in the postoffice at night is reduced, thereby lessening the possibility of delay. Mailing during the morning and early afternoon clears the way for more expeditious handling and dispatch of the important evening mails. Matter mailed early is dispatched on trains that are not heavily laden with mail, with consequent more efficient train handling. Matter mailed early usually reaches the large business centers at a time when it can be readily distributed and therefore is more likely to receive prompt delivery there. One of the big human items in the early mailing campaign is that it reduces the amount of night work at postoffices and allows the postal employees more time with their families, or for recreation.

The postoffice department urges the merchants and senders of mail to try out the "mail early campaign" for a week at least and observe the results of the trial. If the amount of mail written between 9 and 12 o'clock noon is posted either in the city boxes or in the postoffice between 12 and 1 o'clock daily, the delivery will be greatly facilitated by the Klamath Falls department.

### OREGON BREVITIES

**PENDLETON**—Eight hundred and sixty-three acres of Indian lands on the Umatilla reservation of an appraised value of \$86,820 will be placed on sale September 15, according to Superintendent E. L. Swartzlander of the Indian Agency, who is mailing advertisements of the sale to prospective bidders. The land is divided in 15 parcels, none exceeding 80 acres and none less than 35 acres of land.

**BEND**—"Mount Jefferson is the hardest climb in the United States, next to the north wall of Mount Baker," said Walter Prigard Eaton, who returned from a trip to the peak. Members of the party climbed to within 300 feet of the top. Eaton and the Fred H. Kiser party will visit Newberry crater and then go to Portland. They obtained excellent films while on the Mount Jefferson trip.

**ALBANY**—Two stills, one of them the largest ever captured in Linn county, were taken by the sheriff and two internal revenue officers from a farm belonging to Kuzman Ognjenovich, a farmer residing 45 miles east of Albany near Lyons. The stills were of 50 and 10 gallons mash capacity respectively.

**MARSHFIELD**—Some of the rural residents who are interested in the opening of the road from the end of the Kentucky Inlet road to connect with the west fork road at Allegany got out and began work slashing brush on the right of way.

**HAINES**—The old Carson mines near this place are being reopened and improvements made to increase

production. The Carson holdings were successfully worked several years ago and were known as among the principal mines in Baker county.

**SALEM**—Jail sentences aggregating about a year, and fines totaling more than \$1500 were the results of recent activities of operatives of the Oregon Anti-Saloon league in Marion county.

A number of the men arrested in raids pleaded guilty, while a majority of the others were convicted. In practically all cases where convictions were obtained the violators were sentenced to terms in the county jail.
