> Sam A. Kozer, secretary of state, has appertioned to the several counrepresenting 5 per cent of the reyear July 1, 1919, to June 30, 1920. The apportionment is based on the area of public lands in each county.

Land acquired by a county or a municipality at tax sale is acquired and held for a corporate purpose and is therefore not subject to taxation while thus held, but upon the sale of such property on contract, or when the land is used for a purpose which affords an income to the municipality holding it, the exemption ceases, according to an opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle, written for the state tax commission.

Oregon's total indebtedness, including all county, city, school, port, irrigation district and drainage district bonds and other obligations is \$107,400,593.84, according to figures compiled by Frank K. Lovell, state tax commissioner.

The state public service commission has completed in pamphlet form a compilation of all general statutory provisions relating to the operation of the commission. The compilation was made by W. P. Eilis, secretary of the commission, and is the first work of the kind ever put out by that department.

The Union Oil company of California has remitted to the secretary of state \$17,706.48, covering the tax on sales of gasoline and distillate in Oregon for the month of June. For sales at general stations the tax aggregated \$16,663.61 and at the Klamath Falls sub-station \$1042.87.

C. H. Gram, state labor commissloner, has been investigating complaints at Pendleton, Baker, La Grande, Huntington and other Eastern Oregon cities.

A total of 2,108,868 gallons of gasoline and 105,777.5 gallons of distillate were sold by the Standard Oil ! company in Oregon during the month of June, according to the company's report to the secretary of state. The total tax paid under the tax law of 1919 was \$31,617.56 and under the tax law of 1921 it was \$32,146.45.


