## COPCOS WIN, 12 TO 3, OVER EWAUNA TEAM

Despite the fact that the Copcos yesterday scored heavily on the Ewaunas, the game was interesting and appreciated by the fans who saw the Copcos clinch the top of the baseball ladder for a week at least, by defeating the Ewaunas by a score of 12 to 3.

The Ewaunas went into the game confident that their latest acquisition to the pitching staff, O'Neill, would be able to hold down the sluggers in the Copco lineup, but the delivery of O'Neill was "found" consistently in the first five innings, and during that time 10 runs were scored, four in the third inning after two outs were made. But the entire blame for the loss of the game could not be ascribed wholly to the pitching of O'Neill, as the Ewauna fielders yesterday failed to recognize the batting strength of the Copcos, and made no variation in their places in the field when a heavy or light hitter was up. As a consequence, ordinary single base hits were stretched into two-baggers and "Babe Ruth" Noel managed to stretch a clean three-bagger into a home run. Another factor, costly errors by the Ewaunas at critical times allowed scores to creep into the Copco column which would have reduced the score by four runs at least.

Sharkey Hutchinson was "right" yesterday, and when a glance at the summary is taken, it will be noticed that 16 Ewaunas fell before his curves in the nine innings played. From the sixth inning on, Hutchinson fanned eight men out of 13 up, at a time in an ordinary close game it would be considered marvelous, but with the lopsided score, this point was overlooked. Another star in yesterday's game was Kenyon, who was at the receiving end for the Copcos. Four hits out of four times up with a three-bagger included, and a constant slamming of the ball to second to keep the players from stealing third, made him stand out in the Copco ranks. Gay and Noel both were prominent, too, as their hits brought in runs. O'Neill of the Ewaunas made two hits out of four times up, one hit being a two-bagger in the ninth.

The Copcos were placed on the defensive when on bases by O'Neill, as he would whirl suddenly when out of the box and slam a vicious ball to either first or second, and several times the Copcos were caught napping. Another feature was his rapid delivery when a batter was sleeping at the plate. These two features made the game better than usual.

A representative crowd was present at the game, and liked the full nine innings of play, as the game was over in time to permit of other pleasures in the afternoon. Good-natured banter was indulged in and the players roared according to true baseball history. Sweeney, of the Copcos, kept up a constant snappy chatter, and put pep in the game for his side. One fan remarked that if all the times made it a practice to use this item in the games here, the games would be snappier.

Next Sunday the Jewels and the Plumbos are scheduled for a contest. The Jewels say that they will win this coming game and tie the Copcos for first place.

### CHARTER AMENDMENTS SUBMITTED TO THE VOERS BY THE COUNCIL

**An Act**  
 To amend the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, entitled "A bill proposed by initiative petition for an act to amend and adopt a charter for the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, to be submitted to the legal voters of the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held in said city on the 10th day of March, 1913," submitted to and approved by the legal voters of said city on the 10th day of March, 1913, as subsequently amended by the legal voters of said city at the special election held therein on the 14th day of November, 1916, and to amend all other amendments thereto.  
 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS that the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, same being an act entitled "A bill proposed by initiative petition for an act to amend, provide and adopt a charter for the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon," to be submitted to the legal voters of the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held in said city on the 10th day of March, 1913," submitted to and approved by the legal voters of said city on the 10th day of March, 1913, as subsequently amended by the legal voters of said city at the special election held therein on the 14th day of November, 1916, and all other amendments thereto, be and the same hereby is amended by adding thereto Section 309 to read as follows:

SECTION 309. (a) For the purpose of providing funds for sewerage purposes the council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and dispose of general obligation sewer bonds of said city in the sum of \$60,000 in denominations of \$1000 or \$500 each, duly signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Police Judge under the corporate seal of the city, having semi-annual interest coupons thereto attached bearing the engraved fac-simile signatures of the Mayor and Police Judge, whereby the city shall be held in substance and effect to undertake and promise to pay the bearer of each of said bonds at maturity thereof the sum therein named in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of value with interest thereon in like gold coin at the rate of not to exceed six per cent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually, said bonds to be known as City of Klamath Falls Sewer Bonds, said bonds to be dated August 1, 1921, and to mature in not to exceed fifteen years from date of issue, principal and interest to be payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City.

(b) The debt limitations contained in the charter of said city shall not apply to the bonds hereby authorized.  
 (c) The council shall each year at the time of making the annual tax levy for city purposes include in such levy a sum sufficient to pay interest due on the outstanding bonds of this issue, and shall in addition thereto levy an additional amount sufficient to pay said bonds at their date or dates of maturity.

RESOLVED FURTHER that this resolution for proposed charter amendments submitted to the voters by the council be filed with the Police Judge of the City of Klamath Falls for submission to the legal voters of said city, for their rejection or approval to be voted upon at a special election to be held as herein provided;

Resolved further that the council deem it advisable and does hereby and herein call and make necessary provision for the holding of a special election which shall be and hereby is called to be held on the 12th day of August, 1921, between the legal voting hours on said date, and that said time be and the same hereby is designated as the time for holding said special election, and the following polling places in said city are hereby designated as the polling places therefor, to-wit:

- First Ward—Brown's carpenter shop, cor. Main and Center.
- Second Ward—City Hall.
- Third Ward—Buesing's Real Estate Office.
- Fourth Ward—Mills Addition Hall.
- Fifth Ward—Chas DeLap House, cor. Upham and Worden, and the following named persons are hereby designated and appointed as and for the judges and clerks of said election, to-wit:

First Ward—Judges, Mrs. F. E. Ankeny, R. J. Sheets, Mrs. Harry Gallagher; Clerks, Mrs. Chas Baldwin, Mrs. James McClure.  
 Second Ward—Judges, W. S. Slough, Fred Buesing, Mrs. Frank Ward; Clerks, Mrs. A. Krause, Mrs. R. E. Wattenburg.  
 Third Ward—Judges, James Lindsay, B. S. Grigsby, Mrs. Nate Otterbein; Clerks, Mrs. Percy Evans, Mrs. W. D. Miller.  
 Fourth Ward—Judges, Mrs. L. A. Will, Mrs. B. E. Hawkins, Mrs. Chas. Thomas; Clerks, Mrs. Staub, Mrs. M. Miller.  
 Fifth Ward—Judges, Mrs. Effie Garcelon, Mrs. J. B. Vollmer, Mrs. J. W. Tunnell; Clerks, Mrs. Joseph Pospisil, Mrs. Geo. Helms.

**An Act**  
 To amend the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, same being an act submitted to and approved by the voters of said city at a special election held therein on March 10, 1913, as subsequently amended at the special election held therein on November 14, 1916, and to amend all other amendments by adding Section 309 providing for an issue of sewer bonds in the sum of \$60,000.00 and for a tax levy to pay

principal and interest thereon.

 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Police Judge be and he is hereby instructed to publish the hereinabove proposed charter amendments submitted to the voters by the council in the manner provided by law; that is to say, by publication of this resolution in full for two consecutive publications within the fifteen days immediately preceding said special election in The Evening Herald same being a newspaper published in the City of Klamath Falls and hereby

designated for said purpose.
