

TENNIS SERIES TO BE OPENED

Tomorrow afternoon, the first matches in the handicap tennis tournament on the Elks court for the silver loving cup will be played and from the arrangement of the sets, some lively contests will occur.

Sunday, Hooper starting at scratch will play Moody who is given 15 plus handicap and Jefferson will try out Epperson, the former with 15 plus handicap and the latter at scratch. These contestants are in group one.

Group two on Sunday will start with a match between Burge Mason, scratch, and Dr. Paul Noel with a 15 plus. Andy McGee and Van Riper are both at scratch in their match.

The winners of the two days division will meet Monday August 8 and play off the semi-finals and on Tuesday, the championship match between the winner of each division is to be played. Some action is to be taken, however, regarding these events relative to the absence of both Hall and Hayden. It is said that the sets may be played out without them but much disappointment would be felt if they were eliminated.
