The route from Drain to Allegany is rough in some places but is a fairly trip and is attracting quite a number from the outside , and A. Massey. many of those going from here to the interior.


Bay to Bandon is in about as good shape as it will be this season and better than later on when the dust will be deeper. It takes about the same length of time to go by way of
