## Double Header at Modoc Park Next Sunday Afternoon

There will be two seven inning games in store for the patrons of the city league Sunday, August 21 at Modoc Park and the battles which have been arranged will be between the Plumbob and Copco teams and the Ewauna and Jewel ball sluggers.

The games are set for 1:30 o'clock sharp as the days are beginning to grow shorter and in order to play at a time when the fans can enjoy them best, the city managers will have the contests opened at that hour.

The teams are all beginning to take on additional strength for the closing contests of the year and a battle royal with many surprises may be put up to the interested fans yet. The Ewaunas have not given hope that the pennant will fall to them yet and Manager Daggett still has a few "cards up his sleeve."

## Pennant Interest Grows As Season Draws Toward End

Much discussion has taken place of late regarding the pennant winner in the city league which soon will finish its 1921 schedule. The city managers have not set a definite date for the league to terminate its existence but it is very likely that by the middle of September, the season will close.

The schedule of the league has been interrupted by the breaking of dates to play outside teams and now, with each team having played eight games, the prospects for this year's winner seems to be slowly centering about either the Copco or Jewel teams, with the Plumbobs still within the hopeful area.

A recheck of the games played this season from the league record gives the official standing of the teams and percentages.

Relative to the runs, hits, stolen bases and errors made by the teams and their respective standing as to individual strength, the following summary of the above points taken from the league records, shows the Jewels as the best fielders from the lack of errors, so far only 24 marking their record, with the Ewaunas a close second with only 27. The Plumbob and Copco teams are the offenders whose record show poorly, the Copco with 34 and the Plumbob with 41. But in batting and runs as well as stolen bases, the Copco team is a shining light.
