

DENY CHARGE OF DISRESPECT TO SOLDIER'S BODY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14—With reference to the report from Newark, N. J., that the body of Private Silvio Buffano, recently brought from France, was left unceremoniously on the doorstep of his father's home...

"This body was escorted to the home of the father by a corporal and seven men.

"The father, mother, sister and a person who appeared to be an undertaker were present.

"It was not possible to take the remains upstairs to the apartment of the father on the second floor as the stairs were narrow and winding.

"At the request of the undertaker who was apparently acting under instructions from the father, the casket was taken out of the shipping case, the shipping case left on the front porch and the casket taken into the front hall.

"The Hoboken Office of the Quartermaster Corps is in receipt of a letter from the father, stating that he was thoroughly satisfied and very much pleased with the way the soldiers handled the matter. He does not know the source of the report.

Major General H. L. Rogers, Quartermaster General of the army, added to this:

"In view of the great care and reverence with which the bodies of our soldier dead are treated by the Cemeterial Division personnel, it is most regrettable that such a unjust statement should have been made. Relatives of the dead from various have written innumerable letters of thanks for the loving care which our soldiers give their fallen comrades as they return their home. The public should know that everything is done to make the last journey what the families would wish it to be."

PROCLAMATION OF MAYOR I. W. S. WILEY, Mayor of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, by virtue of the authority in me vested by Section 15 of Ordinance No. 554, filed in the office of the police judge, on July 18, 1921, entitled, "An ordinance providing for the manner of exercising in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, the initiative and referendum powers reserved to the legal voters of every municipality, by section 1 and section 1a of article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, do hereby proclaim that the proposed amendment to the charter of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, the same being denominated section 399, submitted to the legal voters of said city at a special election held on Friday, the 12th day of August, A. D. 1921, received the requisite majority vote entitling the aforesaid amendment to be and the same hereby is, proclaimed as having been adopted.

I, the said mayor, hereby further proclaim that the proposed amendment submitted to the qualified electors of said city as said election, to-wit:

An Act To amend the charter of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, same being an act submitted to and approved by the voters of said city at a special election held therein on March 10, 1913, as subsequently amended at the special election held therein on November 14, 1916, and to amend all other amendments by adding section 399, providing for an issue of sewer bonds in the sum of \$50,000.00, and for a tax levy to pay principal and interest thereon, received 265 votes for, and 33 votes against.

That said amendment having received a majority of all votes cast at said election for and against adoption, and it further appearing from such canvass that said amendment received a total of 265 affirmative votes. I, the mayor aforesaid, hereby proclaim, in view of the fact that from the canvass duly made, wherein it appears that only 33 negative votes were cast for said amendment, that said amendment has been duly adopted by the qualified voters of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon.

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OREGON BREVITIES

SALEM—Manual training will not be discarded by the Salem Junior high school next year. This was announced here today following the report that this course would have to be eliminated because of a lack of funds.

BAKER—Another evidence of renewed interest in eastern Oregon mining is the arrival of Frank Duprat and son L. V. Duprat from Pendleton. They are on their way to the Bright Carbonate mining property in the Greenhorn section.

CRATER LAKE—A big event at Crater lake was the launching of the first real motor boat to ply its waters from the shores of Wizard Island. Owing to the extremely short seasons and having to transport all material down 1000 feet from trail to the water's edge, then by a small boat to the island, it has taken four years to complete its construction. The boat, which is 40 feet in length, has a capacity of 45 passengers, and will be christened "The Sparrow" in honor of Alex Sparrow, superintendent of Crater lake park. The Mazamas have been given the honor of making the first trip around the lake.

PORTLAND—Confessing to have preyed upon bootlegging joints as a "safe bet," three 18-year-old youths, Gilbert Viggers, Walter Proudly and Claude Sorenson, are in the city jail, the first two on a charge of larceny and Sorenson charged with vagrancy. They were arrested early this morning by Sergeant Mallon and Inspector Powell at Second and Burnside streets.

PORTLAND—A trial and conviction over a long-distance telephone, with the principals stationed at four separate telephones, was arranged and carried through recently by E. H. McDaniels supervisor of the Siskiyou national forest.

PORTLAND—A resumption of the eruption of hot sands and steam from Crater rock on the southwest slope of Mount Hood, was noted by persons at government camp hotel, according to a long-distance telephone report from L. F. Pridemore, proprietor of the hostelry.
