CONFIDENCE IN BETTER TIMES IS INCREASING

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 20—Confidence that the future will show improvement in the industrial situation has been expressed in Oregon, Washington and California, according to a report made public here by the employment service of the United States department of labor.
"Widespread unemployment continues, despite some improvement in the industrial situation and increased relief afforded by seasonal occupations and public improvements," the report said. "Many workers in shipping and building trades are idle as the result of industrial controversies. There is slow and only partial recovery in lumber, many plants operating with reduced forces and others being closed. Fishing fruit and vegetable industries are more active. Shipbuilding is slackening, with further reductions expected. Lower construction costs have revived home building in some sections, but no great momentum has yet been gained. Farm help is plentiful for present needs."
The report for each of the coast states follows:
CALIFORNIA—Reports of the state public employment bureau a decrease of 26% from the 243,866 positions filled during the fiscal year 1920. Largest placements are recorded among workers in hotels, restaurants, public institutions and the building trades. While unemployment and part-time continue, improvement is expected to follow reductions in costs. Horticultural commissions report adequate supply of farm labor, the demand being met locally, though Santa Cruz and Napa counties are expected to need extra fruit help at the end of August. Transient help arriving in Kings county is considered sufficient for the peach harvest. Activities in fruit and vegetables show improvement. While considerable new home construction is in progress, the housing shortage is still large. Industry generally seems hopeful and expectant of continued improvement.
OREGON—Reemployment is steadily progressing, as an accompaniment to increased activity in the leading industrial lines. Lumber is improving; other industries are seemingly marking time, awaiting developments. No serious housing shortage is reported from any section of the state. New residence construction is increasing, mainly in the cities. Conservative optimism generally prevails among business interests.
WASHINGTON—Restriction in all lines continues, but employment

gains are noticeable, due mainly to seasonal activities and public works. Lumber and allied industries are still depressed, with many mills continuing on a restricted basis. Lack of demand and high freight rates are blamed for the depression. Supply of farm help is ample; in all sections the demand is below the average. Retail trade is moderately good, with further improvement expected. Tendency to home owning has made building fairly active in some sections. No great change is anticipated within the next three months.

Want Highway to Link Scenic Spots Of Three States

The chamber of commerce is in receipt of a communication from S. B. Vincent, manager of the Oregon Tourist Information Bureau at Portland, inquiring whether a scenic route from Klamath county to California and Nevada was possible.
Mr. Vincent stated that many Californians would go from the Pacific highway to Lake Tahoe, then on down to Truckee, California, thence to Reno, Nevada and from there take a northern route up into Modoc county and finally into Klamath Falls and on through Oregon if it were possible to arrange for a good road in Nevada and Modoc county, California.
