10,000 MISHAPS IN INDUSTRIES OCCUR YEARLY

"Oregon Safety News" is the name of a new publication whose mission is what the name implies, the spreading of the doctrine of safety first as a means of preventing industrial accidents. Following is an article from the Safety News, giving a few statistics of the loss through accidents in industries in Oregon every year:

The labor power destroyed in Oregon each year by industrial accidents is equivalent to the total labor power of a concern employing 5,107 workmen and operating 300 work-days during the year.

That's hard to believe, isn't it? Well, it's true.

And here are the facts:

The average number of accidents under the compensation act each year during a period of four years for each kind of disability follows:

136 fatal and permanent total disability cases.

611 permanent partial disability cases.

9,729 cases where workmen were only disabled temporarily.

A total of 10,476 cases per year.

Using the national standard of measurement, each fatal or permanent total disability case equalled a loss of 20 potential work years, or a total of 2,720 work years.

By the same system of measurement, the loss occasioned by the 611 permanent partial disability cases amounted to 1879 work years.

And the total actual days away from employment resulting from the 9729 temporary cases was 508 work years. The total of these three types of disability is 5107 work years.

By again referring to the preceding paragraph, you will also note that the temporary disabilities alone result in approximately 508 workmen in the state being constantly away from their employment because of injuries.

And in addition to this showing, if a fellow could adequately express the sum total of pain, and suffering, and bereavement, caused by these accidents, would that not be a

LUMBER TRADE SHOWS SIGNS OF A STRONG RALLY

"The general lumber market continues to show improvement and the most encouraging feature to the lumber manufacturers is that the improvement is largely in trades which have not been showing much activity for some months," says the American Lumberman's weekly report.

"For example, railroad buying is becoming a considerable factor in the market, thus making it possible to dispose of lumber for which there has been little or no demand for some time. The furniture manufacturers are also buying considerable quantities of hardwoods though they are finding it difficult to secure as much high graded stock as they would like.

"The fact is hardwood production has been on a scantier basis this year than for many years and, although hardwood sales have been limited, the situation is such that at present there is very little unsold high grade hardwood in the South, in the West, or in the North, therefore an increase in buying is sure to exert a very strong effect on the market—much stronger in fact, than would be the case were a normal amount of hardwood lumber being produced.

"House building is going along in fair volume in the cities. There are prospects that even though fall is approaching the volume of house building will be fairly large because money is becoming more plentiful with the result that banks are showing a tendency to be more liberal in making home building loans. One of the greatest factors which has held back home building this year has been the inability to secure loans and consequently an increase in the amount of money available for loans is going to result in some stimulation to building.

"Production, shipments and orders practically offset each other; and is splendid inspiration to the employers and workmen who are now making earnest efforts to eliminate preventable accidents in our commonwealth.
