

# BIG LEAGUE BALL ON LOCAL LOT SUNDAY

Big league baseball was dished up for the spectators at the games between the Ewaunas and Jewel teams and the Copco and Plumbobs yesterday at Modoc park and the two seven inning games were not only well played but were highly satisfactory to the spectators.

The games were full of surprises and the particular shock which came was the winning of both games by the "cellar teams." The league leaders both were turned under by the onslaught of the Plumbobs and Ewaunas and to say that the victories won yesterday were earned is hardly enough praise for the winners. O'Neill, the pitcher for the Ewaunas was practically invincible as he was in the Ewauna-Plumbob game on July 24. Cook held the haughty Copco safe at all stages of the game and never allowed them to do anything with his delivery except in the third inning when bunched hits scored three runs. After that, no Copco was able to cover the circuit. In the sixth inning, the Plumbobs bunched their hits, coupled with a couple of bad errors and secured four runs, winning the game practically in this inning.

Two base hits were the limit yesterday and no three baggers or home runs featured in either game. Even Babe Ruth Noel was shy his customary three bagger or a home run, the first game that he has really ever failed to get "his." Particular praise was bestowed on Thrasher, the second baseman of the Plumbobs. His work was above par. Three hits, three put outs and the accepting of five difficult chances were points which made him stand out yesterday above all the other players. The summary below tells the story best:
