## PICTURESQUE SCENIC ATTRACTIONS OF KLAMATH'S EAST LAKE SHORE DRIVE DECLARED UNIQUE BY WRITER

The Herald several weeks ago suggested that Klamath folk would do well to capitalize the scenic advantage where the Algoma grade reaches the summit near the Algoma mill. The Huber Construction company, of its own volition, planned to widen the road here for a parking place when the rock crusher was removed.

"We can't do as much as we'd like," C. A. Dunn, general superintendent, told the writer. "We'd like to cut the whole point down to grade, but on account of the cost we will be compelled to leave an elevation in the center, but we plan to smooth that bank of rocks off and by planing some shrubbery or grass on it, it will not look at all bad."

"But Klamath county should plan on acquiring the portion of the point which I understand is privately owned. If the county doesn't some private resort keeper will make a fortune out of the view."

Later, Mr. Dunn thought, when the county had some excess funds the point could be levelled off and a pavilion and parking ground established.

All this is called to mind by the recent page in the Portland Journal, devoted to Klamath county roads, in which R. C. Johnson, the special highway writer, describes his impressions of the wonder of the east shore highway. The article was illustrated by a half page of pictures. The text of the story is reproduced:

Klamath county has one of the most picturesque highways in Oregon. It is the drive along the eastern shore of Upper Klamath lake. It is distinguished from other scenic highways in the state from the fact that it presents an unrivaled view of lake and mountain. For a distance of approximately 20 miles the highway, which is a link in The Dallas-California highway,

way to be put under construction was from the north city limits of Klamath Falls through Pelican city to a junction with the old road for a total length of 3.3 miles. The new route is more scenic and shorter than the old road and eliminates "Adobe Hill," one of the worst pieces of road in the county during the winter season. The railroad track is crossed with an overhead structure about one mile north of Pelican city. Grading and macadamizing on this section was begun late in the fall of 1918 and finished in the fall of 1920. The work was done by the Klamath county court on the basis of cost plus 10 per cent.

When finished the job was unsatisfactory and the cost had greatly exceeded the estimate. It will have to be gone over again. The next section of the highway to be put under contract was the one north of the above mentioned to the southern boundary of the Klamath Indian reservation at Barclay springs, a distance of approximately nine miles. This contract for grading and macadamizing was let in 1919 but the work moved slowly. It was not completed until quite recently. The total estimate of the cost of this section is \$145,000. Of this amount the state is to pay \$36,467, the county \$26,375 and the federal government \$72,157.

The last section, from Barclay springs to Lamm's mill, a distance of five miles, was let early this spring to the Warren Construction company for grading and was finished shortly after the first of the present month. The estimated cost is \$81,900 of which the county contributed \$20,000. There was no federal aid on this project.

During construction the county operated a ferry between Barclay springs and Lamm's mill at a cost of about \$30 per day to take care of the traffic. It is expected that the state will reimburse the county a part of the cost.

Only Recently Completed In addition to the lake shore drive other highway work in Klamath county by the state included the road between Klamath Falls to Merrill and the road from Merrill to Malin near the California boundary. These projects were undertaken in 1919 but have only been recently completed except in the case of the Merrill-Malin road on which construction is just beginning.

The Klamath Falls-Merrill project begins at the city limits of Klamath Falls and extends 14.68 miles into Merrill. The estimated cost of the project is \$180,000 of which the state's share is \$49,792; the county's \$45,000, and the federal government, \$85,207.

The Klamath Falls-Dairy project is 13.91 miles in length. This road furnishes an outlet to Poe valley, Langell valley, Yonna valley and the Sprague River valley. It is also a part of the Lakeview-Klamath Falls highway. The new road follows closely the old road but eliminates a grade crossing near Dairy by

means of an overhead crossing. The cost of the project is estimated at \$160,000. Of this amount the state and
