### NEWS FROM THE STATE CAPITAL

SALEM, Or., Aug. 30.—Dr. R. E. L. Steiner, superintendent of the state hospital for the insane, will place before the state board of control shortly a proposal to construct a ward for criminally insane at the state penitentiary.

J. S. Landers, well-known western educator, who has held important positions in Oregon, has been chosen by the board of regents of the state normal school at Monmouth as president of the school to succeed the late J. H. Askerman. The board previously had elected Dr. Fred C. Ayer, of Seattle, but he declined.

George A. White, adjutant general, and members of the world war veterans' state aid commission, and Lyman G. Rice, of Pendleton, also a member of the commission, are visiting American Legion posts throughout the state.

Members of the civilian rifle team that will represent Oregon at the national shoot at Camp Perry, O., beginning August 27, have been appointed by Governor Olcott as follows: H. W. McBride, Portland, captain; Edwin D. Whitney of Portland, team coach. Team members—R. D. Archer, W. W. Phillips, James D. Fall, A. Flavius West and A. D. Schmidt, all of Portland; Harry Bowers of Corvallis, O. Royce of Seaside, William F. Jones of Seaside and from Mentor, M. O. White, Omer Hastie, Carl Jensen and William Maris.

T. B. Handley, state corporation commissioner has announced that unpaid license fees of corporations operating in Oregon are now delinquent and that interest will be charged at 6 per cent.

Douglas County Taxpayers' league is making an effort to eliminate the county educational board and the school supervisory system, according to information reaching the office of J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools

George C. Wimer, Southern Pacific clerk, and H. A. Tibbitts, Southern Pacific agent at Myrtle creek, have placed before Governor Olcott their claim to a portion of the reward offered for the capture of Dr. R. M. Brumfield, of Roseburg, suspected of the murder of the murder of Dennis Russell. They gave information concerning a package that was shipped to Brumfield from Myrtle Creek to Seattle on July 13.

O. P. Hoff, state treasurer, has delivered to the United States National bank of Portland state highway bonds aggregating \$2,000,000. They were sold at a recent meeting of the state board of control, bringing \$2,007,828.

According to a report by T. A. Rafferty, chief state traffic inspector, representatives of his department during July traveled 10,847

miles, visited 163 towns and cities and were responsible in returning to the department license and other fees aggregating \$1273. Fines during the month resulting from their activities totaled \$7548.80.

Because of the lack of available airplanes, the state forestry department is considering abandoning the airplane forestry patrol in Oregon.

The Ochoco irrigation district has filed with the state irrigation securities commission an application for the certification of an additional bond issue of \$75,000. The money will be used to make repairs necessitated by a recent storm. Previously \$1,350,000 in bonds has been certified for the district.

Enrollment in the schools of Douglas county during the last school year was 4566, against 4290 the previous year, according to a report of O. C. Brown, Douglas county superintendent to J. A. Churchill, state superintendent.

For the week ending August 18 a total of 408 accidents were reported to the state industrial accident commission and there were no fatalities.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—W. L. Thompson, vice-president of the First National bank of Portland, who is to be appointed to office with the war finance corporation, is on his way home to Portland to arrange his affairs so that he can take up his work in Washington within the next week or ten days.

#### Scabies Eradicated Among California Flocks is Claim

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 30.—California sheepmen who have annually for years lost thousands of dollars because of scab may have that within a reasonable length of time the disease will be eradicated, according to Dr. J. P. Iverson of the Division of Animal Industry of the State Department of Agriculture.

The disease, thanks to the co-operation extended by the sheepmen, the federal and local authorities, is causing practically no losses in California, Iverson said, whereas in California, Iverson said, whereas in 12 or 15 years ago nearly all bands in the state were affected to such an extent that the wool yield was reduced, in many cases as much as 15 per cent below normal production.

In addition to the loss in wool, the animals in many cases lost in flesh, thus preventing the sheepmen from marketing their lambs and wethers profitably.

The friendly relations existing be-

tween the sheepmen and the state department will serve to eradicate the disease in a short time, he said.
