

FEW SAGE HENS LEFT DECLARES BEND NIMROD

Sage hens are likely to be as extinct as the carrier pigeon in a few years unless steps are taken for their protection, according to H. N. Bach-walter, secretary of the Bend Rod and Gun club, who writes in a recent issue of the Bend Bulletin as follows:

Like the wild pigeons of the middle west which are now but a memory in the minds of our fathers there is a game bird of Central Oregon which is swiftly disappearing from the great plateaus of the so-called desert.

The days of the sage hen as a game bird are numbered. This fact is irrefutable, but I cannot blame the hunters for the rapid decrease in the flocks of this desert bird.

They still thrive in great numbers in a few isolated sections of Central Oregon where I have seen them rise in such numbers as to obscure the sun like a great cloud, and they perhaps will live and thrive there for centuries provided these areas are set aside as federal game preserves.

Only a few years ago sportsmen can recall when sage hens were plentiful only a few miles from Bend—when a ten mile trip would net one all the birds he wanted. Three years ago they were still numerous forty or fifty miles out on the desert. This year there are only a few scattering flocks within sixty miles of Bend and the birds have only been found in quantities at a distance of one hundred miles out. In other words the sportsmen of Bend have now crowded the sage hen out to a point where he has no range left undisturbed, as we are now hunting in country all ways covered by shooters from other towns and I venture to say that another three years will see the end of the sage hen in Central Oregon as a game bird. And I still contend that it is not due to the numbers killed each season that the birds are decreasing.

THE STRAND.
