**Canada Backward  
In Readjustment  
Says Local Lawyer**

Chas. F. Stone, local attorney, returned last night from a two month's vacation in the Canadian Rockies. Mrs. Stone and nephew, Joe Skelton, are on the way back by automobile. They will see the Glacier national park en route and come home by way of Reno, Nevada. By auto as far as the road would permit, then by wagon, and finally with pack horses Mr. and Mrs. Stone got back into the mountains 100 miles from Edmonton, Canada, on the James river. The country was a wilderness, said Mr. Stone, teeming with beaver, bear and moose. It lies close to the Canadian national park and there is little hunting, due to its remoteness, so that overflow of animals from the park are present in abundance.

Canada is not nearly as far along in post-war readjustment as the United States, says Mr. Stone. Wages have been reduced without corresponding reducing living costs. In

consequence there is much discontent and unemployment. A satisfactory meal cannot be obtained in Canada for less than \$1.50, said Mr. Stone. However as he was not on a tour of economic investigation but a pure pleasure trip, he made but cursory comment on costs but was very emphatic in his declaration that his vacation trip was the most enjoyable of all his experience.
